May His church experience an extraordinary spiritual revival and be filled with great hope of the second coming of Jesus Christ!

Jesus is certainly coming soon. He says, "Yes, I am coming quickly" (Revelation 22:20).

1000 Missionary Movement

The Outset of the 1000 Missionary Movement

The 1000 Missionary Movement is “the Greatest Challenge of the Century,” begun with the mission to arm young people with missionary training to spread the gospel to the end of the world and after their one year of mission service, to enable them to better serve their own local churches.

The mission and objectives of this movement are to protect Adventist young people from the evil influences of the world; to quickly finish the gospel work, particularly in the unentered territories of the Northern and Southern Asia-Pacific Divisions; and to strengthen the local churches with a volunteer missionary spirit.

Statistics

Since 1993, 6,588 young people from 59 countries have joined the 1000 Missionary Movement. The fruits of their labor include 66,099 baptisms, 763 church buildings constructed, and 1,366 churches and companies established in 39 countries.

Life-long Missionary Movement System

The 1000 Missionary Movement Headquarters, which has contributed to world mission beyond the borders of Asia for 23 years, is dreaming a new dream. They would like to suggest a practical mission paradigm for our Adventist church, preparing for Jesus’ second coming using a new system of ministry to dispatch 1000 missionaries. This system is the “From Cradle to Crown Missionary Movement.”

Children Missionary Movement (CMM)

Just imagine the glowing eyes of the 12-year-old boy Jesus who was sharing questions with the scholars in the temple of Jerusalem. His childhood was a preparation period for His public ministry as a missionary at the age of 30. The one who grew in favor with God and men is the best model for our children missionary project. The 1000 Missionary Movement is extending the Children Missionary Movement, which was initiated by the Northern and Southern Asia-Pacific Divisions in 2002, and working together with the help of the Korean Union Conference to equip 10,000 devoted children as missionaries. We hope that this Movement will become a worldwide Movement. More than a thousand will devote themselves for world mission.

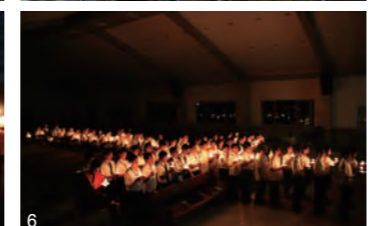

Academy Missionary Movement (AMM)

Senior Missionary Movement (SMM)

Due to the development of the medical system, life expectancy has improved steadily all over the world. Retired specialists who are more than 60 years old still have vigorous power and health, wisdom, experiences and passion to extend their quality services. They can also contribute to world mission.
"My age? I am still young," says Epigenia Salas, a 44th batch missionary. "I am only 88, and I have worked with my partner in Mindanao, Philippines. Do I look tired? No! For Jesus Christ who saved me, until the point of death, I will live for Him in my mission field as a missionary. This is my only hope and destiny."

Pioneer Mission Movement

The Outset of the Pioneer Mission Movement

The Pioneer Mission Movement (PMM) is a global mission project of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD) for the purpose of church planting in its territories. Its goal is to send equipped pastors and their families to other countries for cross-cultural missionary work. The PMM is a mission movement that plants new churches in areas where there is no Adventist church and that nurtures churches that have few members but no growth.

The ultimate purpose of this movement is to send as many missionaries as the fields are calling, who have prepared themselves and who are full of the mission spirit. These missionaries will nurture weak churches that have no pastors with the Three Angels' Messages in order to prepare them for the second coming of Christ. At the same time, they will proclaim the gospel message to those who have never heard of Jesus Christ that they may have eternal life.

Statistics

In 2003, the first five PMM missionary families were dispatched to the mission. There have been 94 missionary families sent out since the foundation of PMM. As of April 2015, 48 families are currently serving in 16 different countries.

The primary goal of the PMM is to plant churches and win souls in previously un-entered areas. As of October 2014, there were 14,203 baptisms and 141 churches that had been planted through the PMM pastors' services since the beginning of the PMM program.

Recent Stories from PMM

Returned PMM Families

Six PMM missionary families have returned to Korea, their home country, after successfully finishing their PMM ministry: Jeon JaeSong – Taiwan; WooJin Lee – Taiwan; SeongCheol Yoon – Taiwan; Cho JangRyol – Taiwan; Song JungWook – Kyrgyzstan and Kazakhstan; and Seo JiHo – UT and Korea. They have planted new churches, built churches, and grown churches. They have accomplished many things through God's power. We are excited about their new ministry as they now serve in their homeland having had special mission field experience. They will show us a new paradigm for Korean Adventist Mission.

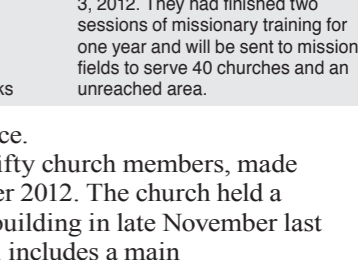
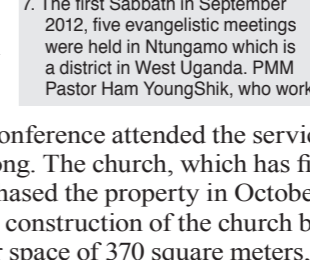
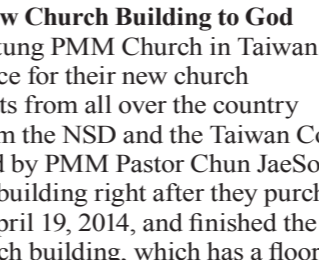
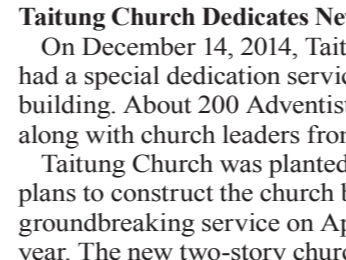
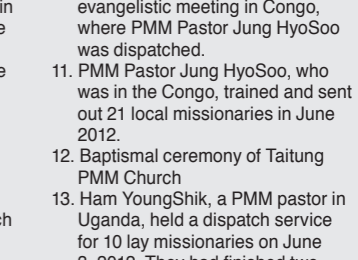
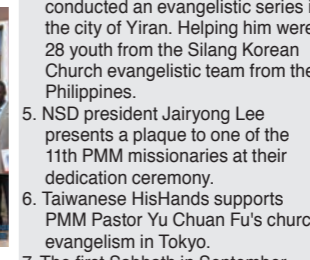
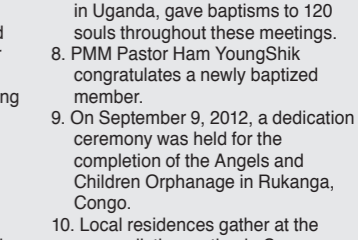
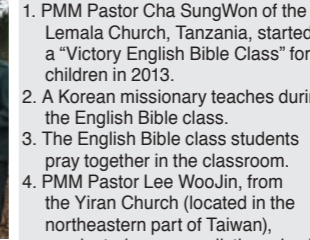

Taitung Church Dedicates New Church Building to God

On December 14, 2014, Taitung PMM Church in Taiwan had a special dedication service for their new church building. About 200 Adventists from all over the country along with church leaders from the NSD and the Taiwan Conference attended the service.

Taitung Church was planted by PMM Pastor Chun JaeSong. The church, which has fifty church members, made plans to construct the church building right after they purchased the property in October 2012. The church held a groundbreaking service on April 19, 2014, and finished the construction of the church building in late November last year. The new two-story church building, which has a floor space of 370 square meters, includes a main hall for divine services, a youth room, a cafeteria, dwelling space for ministers, and guest rooms.

Pastor Chun JaeSong stated, "The one thing our church members and I are so sure about is that we did not build this church but God did. We are seeing not just a church building, but God's blessings. Moreover, it has been a pleasure for me as the pastor of Taitung Church to see that the church members have experienced God's mighty hand and that their faith has grown. I pray that the gospel of His kingdom will be spread to the whole world through this church."

The Outset of the HisHands Mission Movement

The Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD) is concentrating its efforts on evangelism through various mission movements in order to fulfill its "Mission First" motto. In 2008, the NSD launched the HisHands Mission Movement in order to inspire Adventist lay members within the NSD with the mission spirit so that they can devote themselves to evangelism and local church work.

HisHands missionaries work in pairs for at least two to three hours a week, sharing Adventist publications and other materials with others. They are expected to serve in their local churches and communities for at least three years.

Two thousand years ago, when Jesus sent His 70 disciples to every town and place where He was about to go, He said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field" (Luke 10:1-2). HisHands missionaries are called by the Lord as workers for the harvest in these last days. The HisHands Mission Movement gives lay Adventists in the NSD an opportunity to participate in domestic mission activities. This is a local church- /community-centered mission movement encouraging church members to work through His spirit, by His power, as His hands.

Statistics

Since the HisHands Mission Movement was initiated in 2008, many lay missionaries have been trained and sent out, and participating churches have experienced spiritual revival and growth. As of March 2015, the accumulated number of HisHands missionaries in the NSD territories was 3,918. There were 2,506 HisHands missionaries in Korea, 454 in Mongolia, 398 in Taiwan, 294 in China, and 266 in Japan.

They held a training workshop and seminar in YuChih Church in Taiwan Adventist College, and Pastor Han SukHee, Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD) HisHands coordinator, served as the speaker. Staff members and students pledged to work continually to accomplish the mission given to them.

Taiwan Adventist College adopted the HisHands Mission Movement as a school project in order to encourage students to develop a mission-oriented spirit. Missionaries will not only help the YuChih community, but they will also serve as missionaries in the local churches of their residency when they go home or after they leave school.

Last October they participated in the 2014 Korea Beauty Expo with the theme “Beauty and Diet in Daily Life.” SDA Fair Mission invited two cuisine experts and opened small cooking classes. There were also other volunteers who shared their expertise with the booth visitors. For example, a laughter therapist and a plastic surgeon shared their knowledge on healthy ways to lose weight. A medical science researcher gave a short lesson on stretches and massage for relieving fatigue and also provided health consultations.

Booth visitors were interested in not only their outer beauty but also their inner beauty and health. It is natural for such people to be attracted to the counsels about diet, food, health, and moderation as well as the gospel message being shared by the Adventist Church.

During the expo period, SDA Fair Mission had more than 13,000 visitors. About 600 of them chose to subscribe to *Home and Health*, a monthly magazine published by the Korean Publishing House. The Mission is planning to deliver God’s message to these subscribers with the cooperation of the HisHands Mission Movement.

“Evangelism through exhibits is a farsighted approach. I am assured that what we have sown is not futile. Let’s have faith that God will make the seeds grow, and move forward in faith,” said NSD president Jairyong Lee.

Mission Day

What Is Mission Day?

All organizations and many of the institutions in the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD) celebrate one or more days a year as Mission Day. Mission Day is a day set by denominational organizations to emphasize mission and evangelism among the faculty and staff members and to help all denominational employees to renew their mission/evangelism spirit and to provide them with opportunities to participate in mission/evangelism activities. Mission Day was first started by the NSD in 2004.

The inspired pen wrote, "Our institutions should be missionary agencies in the highest sense, and true missionary work always begins with those nearest. In every institution there is missionary work to be done" (7T, 146).

The Outset of Mission Day

There are almost two hundred organizations and institutions, large and small, in the NSD, including the division, with a total of 13,000 employees. According to the mission statement of the organizations and institutions at different levels, their mission is to proclaim the everlasting gospel which is in Revelation 14:6-13 to those who live on earth and to every nation, tribe, language, and people. All denominational employees should not only participate in evangelism, but they should set a good example for other church members.

According to NSD president Jairyong Lee, "All that we do in our everyday lives should be to accomplish this great mission. This mission should be considered the most important matter in our plans, strategies and activities. Without this mission, all that we are doing in our institutions, schools, hospitals, food factories, conferences, unions, divisions and the General Conference is meaningless, and will digress into a business that is not much different from any other secular business."

If all institutions were to set a day as Mission Day each year, and if every active employee handed out at least 200 tracts, almost three million individuals in our division territories would be reached with the Three Angels' Messages. If all of the 700,000 Adventist members in the division set a day modeling after the institutional employees' Mission Day activities, and if they each handed out at least 100 tracts, seventy million tracts would be given to those who are waiting for the gospel.

The NSD piloted the Mission Day program in 2004 to see if it would work before recommending it to subordinate organizations. The division officers and staff members found it quite beneficial to them and the Adventist Church was better introduced to its neighbors and business associates. Sometimes they were gladly welcomed in busy stores while they were refused in the streets. But at the end of the activities, all of them gave testimonies that they had been accompanied by the Holy Spirit. Many of them stated that they had discovered a kind of instinct for sharing their faith which had been hidden by neglecting to respond to the calls of the Holy Spirit.

What Do We Do on Mission Day?

On Mission Day, the division prepares a Mission Day lunch for visitors. Several weeks before Mission Day, invitation letters are sent to the neighbors. As they come to the Mission Day lunch, neighbors introduce themselves to each other. They are already familiar with some faces from their bustling daily lives, but they have not had the opportunity to meet each other. The Mission Day lunch table is a good place to get to know their neighbors. Work-related neighbors, such as bankers, office material suppliers, local church pastors near the institutions, and others are invited. They chat together and are introduced to the local churches.

Once a month, employees of the Publishing House go to the streets and house-to-house with magazines. The food factory provides a party each year in honor of senior citizens. Adventist hospitals invite the public to specialized seminars on specific diseases. Adventist schools invite non-Adventist parents to health cooking classes. There are so many ways to manage Mission Day.

As follow-up, after Mission Day, people who shared their mailing addresses are sent Adventist magazines, such as *Signs of the Times* and *Home and Health*. Pastors and church members visit their homes, and invitation letters to public evangelistic meetings are sent to them.

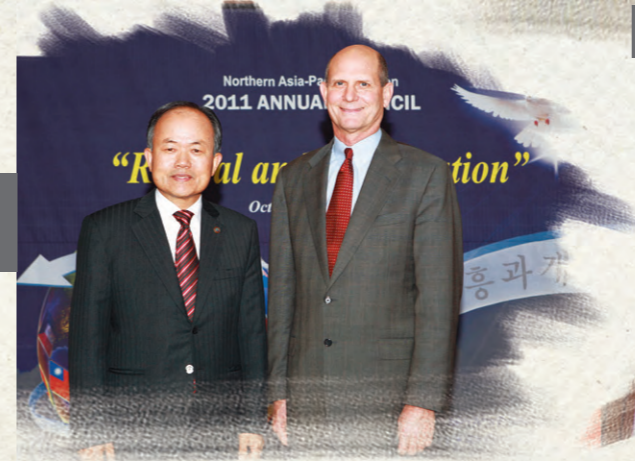

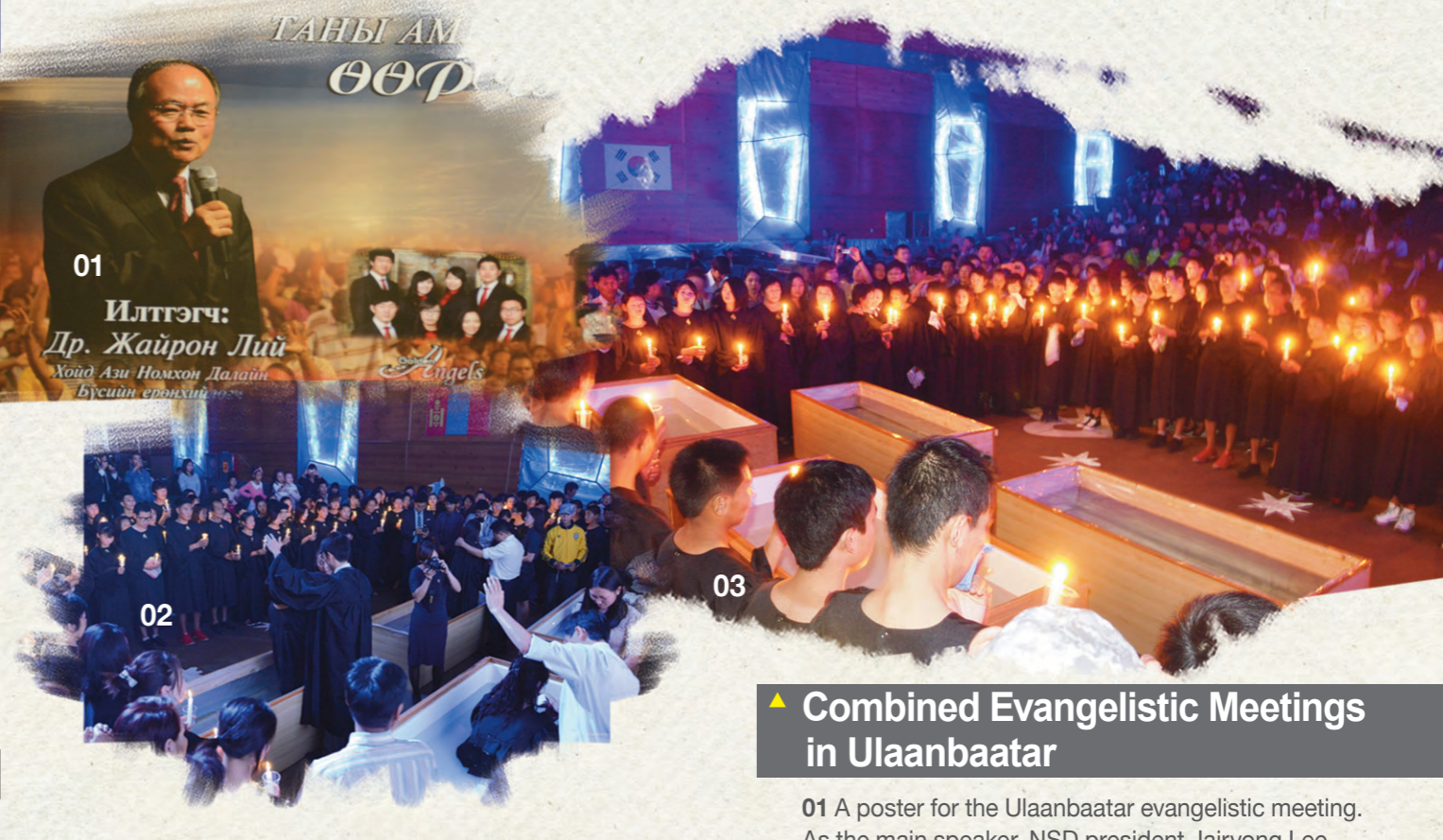
