Total Member Involvement Required Jairyong Lee, President Northern Asia-Pacific Division

The Three Angels Messages reached most of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD) territory more than 100 years ago. Abram La Rue arrived in Hong Kong as a self-supporting lay missionary in 1888, and W. C. Grainger arrived in Japan in 1896 as a missionary officially sent by the General Conference. The Adventism message arrived in Korea in 1904.

The Lord has blessed His work in the NSD territory in many remarkable ways. Now there are a little more than 700,000 Seventh-day Adventist Christians in this region. We praise God for the wonderful expansion of the gospel work far and near.

However, thinking of the enormous population in the region (1.6 billion), we understand that we have more work to do. There is a greater part of the work that remains undone. It seems that the environment for doing evangelism has become more challenging. People today seem more interested in worldly things due to the influence of secularism and materialism. People are constantly moving to large cities looking for better job opportunities and educational advantages. Many people seem uninterested in the Christian message. If this trend continues, evangelism will become even more challenging in five to ten years. Therefore, while we still have many mission opportunities, we should diligently and earnestly focus on our work. Now is the time!

The NSD has set a goal for this new quinquennium of reaching one million members: "Vision One Million 2020." It seems a very high goal and almost impossible to reach when we consider the past trend of church growth. However, we believe that nothing is impossible with God. Jesus said, "What is impossible with men is possible with God" (Luke 18:27). Ellen White encouraged us saying, "We are altogether too narrow in our plans. We need to be broader minded" (*Ev*, 46). We need to aim high, earnestly pray for our goal, and work together with united hearts. By the grace of God and through the power of the Holy Spirit we will certainly reach the goal.

To accomplish this goal, we need Total Member Involvement. Ellen White, time and again, emphasized that everyone in the church should get involved in the mission of the church. She states, "It is the privilege of every Christian, not only to look for, but to hasten the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ" (*COL*, 69); "Every true disciple is born into the kingdom of God as a missionary" (*DA*, 195); "Every follower of Jesus has a work to do as a missionary for Christ, in the family, in the neighborhood, in the town or city where he lives" (*2T*, 632); "To save souls should be the life work of everyone who professes Christ" (*ChS*, 10); "Everyone who has received Christ is called to work for the salvation of his fellow men" (*AA*, 110).

In this mission, all church entities should be actively involved; all church institutions should seriously participate; all church departments should be absolutely mission focused; all church workers need to be mission oriented; and all church members should work as missionaries of Christ. This is Total Member Involvement.

When we unite with the "Mission First" spirit and move forward together to fulfill the mission of the church, the power of the Holy Spirit will be poured upon us without measure. God will use us in unusual ways to reach unreached people with the gospel message. Then the goal of "Vision One Million 2020" will be reached by the grace of God and through His divine power.

Let us daily think, talk, pray and actively participate in the mission of the church. The Lord will help us reach the goal of one million members by 2020. God is calling us now. God is waiting for us to respond so that united, we can go forward and be a part of this great mission.

"Build the Church of God! Jesus Is Coming!"

By the strong promptings of the Holy Spirit, the church in Japan is beginning to move forward. As if going along with the movement of the Holy Spirit, after five years since his last visit, General Conference president Elder Ted Wilson and his wife, Nancy Wilson, came to Japan from March 10 to 14, 2016.

On March 12, about 1,100 church members gathered for the special worship service at the Makuhari International Training Center in Chiba. The title of the sermon was "Build the Church of God! Jesus Is Coming!"

As Elder Wilson preached from Nehemiah chapter 6, he appealed to the congregation saying, "We are living in the last days of Earth's history. Please build the church of God through the power of the Holy Spirit." After the sermon, the congregation paired up in groups and prayed as they dedicated themselves for a new beginning.

We opened the afternoon service with a special welcome message by Jairyong Lee, president of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD), and special music selections by more than one hundred Hiroshima Saniku High School choir members and graduates. In the afternoon, we were introduced to the following upcoming projects: new youth evangelism project called "Gideon 300," the Tokai International Evangelism Center, and the Youth Rush Japan project. Nancy Wilson also made special appeals to the Japanese women in the congregation. During the afternoon service, in between each segment of the program, the newly formed Media Publishing Department promoted

various books, media, and the Hope Channel Japan website with much creativity and thought.

President Shimada and the GC leaders (Ted Wilson, G. T. Ng, and Michael Ryan) discussed the work of evangelism in Japan. As evangelism work in the world includes evangelism work in Japan, the GC leaders will earnestly pray and support the evangelistic work in Japan. Total Member Involvement (TMI) was emphasized multiple times throughout the day, with an appeal that every church member in Japan must be involved in evangelism work.

On this weekend, the All Japan Literature Evangelism Rally and the All Japan Youth Conference were held simultaneously at their respected locations. On Friday night, more than 200 young people attended the special worship service at the Tokyo Central Church in Harajuku to hear Ted Wilson preach a special message.

One of the reasons Elder Wilson and his wife came to Japan was to discuss with the leaders in Japan the evangelistic campaign scheduled for May 2018. On Friday, March 11, the JUC evangelism committee members gathered for a special meeting. On Sunday, March 13, the JUC board members had very profitable discussions about evangelism.

Elder Wilson said, "The Lord is showing a special interest in big city evangelism. More than half the world's population lives in the cities. Therefore we must follow 'Christ's Method' and reach out to people. In the big cities, health evangelism is especially effective. Every Seventhday Adventist must have compassion and be involved in this work. Even in Tokyo, the harvest is great, but the laborers are few. The big agenda for us is to figure out how to implement Total Member Involvement. Please figure out how to implement Total Member Involvement in Japan."

After the discussion, we came to the conclusion that the 2018 evangelistic campaigns will be to harvest and close people on making decisions. Before the harvest, we

Elder Ted Wilson Encourages Adventists in Hong Kong

Hong Kong-Macao Conference (HKMC) held an evening prayer meeting on March 16, 2016, at Kowloon Seventh-day Adventist Church, Hong Kong. Nearly 500 people filled the sanctuary. The theme of the night was "Power in Prayer."

Elder Ted Wilson, president of the General Conference (GC), was the honored speaker. He began his message by quoting Jeremiah 33:3, "Call to me and I will answer you and tell you great and unsearchable things you do not know."

Wilson told his audience that by seeking God in prayer we could accomplish the seemingly impossible task of evangelizing our rapidly urbanized world. "Despite the overwhelming population in this modern city, you can finish God's work here if you trust God for strength." He then offered a heart-felt prayer to dedicate the Adventist leaders and lay people to God's work.

Dr. Jairyong Lee, president of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division, was present at the meeting. He and Wilson were attending the 10th Chinese Ministries Convention in Hong Kong. Fulfilling the Gospel Commission has always been a great challenge in Japan. Missionaries, pastors, church members and administrators have faced various obstacles since Christianity first arrived on the shores of this island nation. In recent decades the Seventh-day Adventist Church has had to seek creative ways of working with added societal challenges, such as secularization, materialism, an aging population, declining church membership, a difficult economy and a shortage of ministers and other workers.

In response to these issues, the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD) recently called together a special commission for the revival and revitalization of Japan Union Conference (JUC). Representative leaders from JUC, NSD, Korean Union Conference, Taiwan Conference, Chinese Union Mission, Mongolia Mission and the General Conference convened from February 23 to 25. 2016, at Makuhari International Training Center in Chiba, Japan. The members spent three days in intensive dialogue and study regarding the present condition of the work in Japan. They also developed strategies to strengthen the Japan Union and all its churches and institutions in fulfilling the mission of the church.

The sessions began with a season of special prayer and an address from NSD president Jairyong Lee clarifying face similar challenges. the purpose of the meetings. The purpose was not to criticize, but to find positive ways of supporting and encouraging the work and workers in JUC. It was also stated that what was learned during the 3-day session

would also serve to educate leaders from other areas in the NSD as they

The first day consisted of detailed reports from all the departments and institutions regarding the present condition and challenges facing each area of the work. What had been done in past years and strategies

that had been employed were also reviewed.

On the second day, the attendees were assigned to various task groups to look at specific issues and to suggest creative and viable strategies for making the work more effective for accomplishing the mission of the Adventist Church in Japan. Each group chose a chairperson who then reported the ideas of their group to the rest of the commission members.

The interactions and reports were very helpful and informative. The attendees were able to return to their various countries and places of service with a better understanding of the present challenges facing the Japan Union and with specific things to pray about.

The NSD officers will follow up the commission meetings by working on synthesizing the strategies that were submitted and deciding which ones have the best potential for success in the effort to revitalize the work in Japan. The NSD will then pass those on to JUC, and JUC will then adopt the various suggestions submitted for trial in the field. The results will be reported at a future commission meeting. Please keep the work and the workers of JUC in your prayers as they strive to revitalize and maximize their mission efforts.

Through a special three-day meeting, a deeper understanding of the current condition of JUC was obtained and creative strategies for its revival were developed.





KUC Launches Hope Channel Korea

The Hope Channel is the official mission media of the Adventist Church and was initiated in 2003. In July 2015, at the 60th General Conference Session, Korea along with five other countries, including Japan and France, officially launched the Hope Channel in their countries. In the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD), Korea and Japan are following after the Chinese Hope Channel, which is spreading the gospel in the mainland through the internet.

In Korea, there are many constraints on entering the cable network market as a religious broadcast. As alternatives, Hope Channel Korea has turned its attention to the potential of Social Networking Service (SNS), including Facebook, Twitter, and Kakao Talk. Nowadays, Facebook accounts of domestic broadcasting companies have actually gained explosive popularity from young people. Kakao Talk is also a major means of public relations by business companies. Media mission through SNS has already become active overseas.

Hope Channel Korea decided to concentrate on SNS, and it began to produce regular content. The initial target is young people, and Hope Channel Korea has been developing youth-specialized content with an SNS mission team made up of young volunteers. One of the main strategies is to increase the number of followers through various cultural events and performances by Adventist youth cultural ministry teams, including Yemoon Agency and Sulammi, Oulim, and Hosanna. In addition, they will operate a professional religious counseling team to connect young people to mentor groups, taking advantage of the free and instant feedback provided by SNS.

The ratio of non-Adventist students in Adventist schools is increasing, but religious education is difficult due to regulations in Korea. In this situation, Hope Channel Korea will serve as a network which gathers Korean young people together in faith. After laying the groundwork for the youth channel, it will produce and distribute various content for adults.

GC Hope Channel Expects Cooperation with Korean Adventist Media Center

Kandus Thorp, vice president of the General Conference (GC) Hope Channel, visited the Korean Union Conference (KUC) Media Center to explain the present condition of the Hope Channel throughout the world and to have a Q&A session about the global project. She demonstrated the Hope Channel broadcast of each country and talked about the importance and future potential of media mission.

Thorp underlined the fundamental principles of the Hope Channel. "The basic concepts of the Hope Channel are prayer, health – holistic and spiritual gift, and biblical doctrines. Although we produce a lot of content, those

three concepts must become the core message in a harmonious way."

She also emphasized that it is essential to have a correct biblical understanding of media ministry. Sadly, Christian media tends to aim for high audience figures like many other commercial media. Thus, unless we understand the Bible, our enemy will penetrate the church through media. "No matter which messages we include into products and which communications network we use, all the content we produce must reveal biblical truths. We should not forget the solemn fact that Hope Channel plays a role as a bride between God and people. We are people of mission. We should give a good impression to the audience so that they can learn healthier and more beautiful Christcentered living through the Hope Channel," continued. Thorp.

The GC Hope Channel is anticipating the growth of media ministry in KUC since it already has a developed broadcasting system and content. They especially have a great interest in Korea's media ministry through SNS.

Hope Channel in the World

Since it began in 2003, Hope Channel has spread Adventist truths through 43 branches. The Hope Channel of each country produces and sends various types of content, such as music videos, animation, documentaries, talk shows and others.

In Brazil where there is a broadcasting station with about 430 workers, Hope Channel is working hard to win souls not only in its own country, but all over South America. The health-related Facebook page of Hope Channel Brazil is so popular that it has received more than 1 million Likes. Local churches in Brazil place the Hope Channel logo on their signs to effectively connect local gospel work to media.

Germany has also focused on direct mission work through broadcasting since 2008, and about 30 devoted

workers are involved in this ministry. Beyond the barrier of individualism, which is a unique culture of advanced countries, the Hope Channel spreads the gospel to each family through media content and, as a result, many seekers have found the truth.

"I am sure that numerous people will discover the truth through media before Jesus' Second Advent," said. Thorp. This ministry, which has potential for growth, requires the interest and positive cooperation of Korean Adventists.



World Church Advisory for a new quinquennium

Once every five years, the year following the General Conference (GC) Session, all of the Church ministries hold world advisories generally at the GC headquarters in Silver Spring, MD, USA. Through this advisory, GC and division ministries directors from around the world review the past, share ideas, and plan for the next five years, seeking God's blessings and guidance.

Secretariat & ASTR (Archives, Statistics and Research)

More than 100 delegates from the General Conference (GC) office and institutions, from the thirteen Divisions and from MENA (Middle East and North Africa Union Mission) and Israel Field gathered together for the quinquennial Secretariat Advisory from March 7 to 9, 2016, and ASTR (Archives, Statistics and Research), March 10 to 12, at the GC office building. It was the first time that the ASTR advisory took place separately as their own scheduled meeting since being organized by the General Conference.

G. T. Ng, GC secretary emphasized "mission as a priority" and "collaboration among departments and agencies" at his first presentation. He quoted from Ellen G. White, "In a special sense Seventh-day Adventists have been set in the world as watchman and lightbearers. To them has been entrusted the last warning for a perishing world... There is no other work of so great importance" (*Evangelism*, 119).

Yutaka Inada, executive secretary of the Northern Asia-Pacific



Division, presented the morning devotional message on the first day of the Secretariat Advisory. He brought out the importance of our mission and appealed to the audience to remember that this world is not our final home and that our eternal home is in heaven.

During the week, the comprehensive work trainings covered the various areas of secretariat. Adventist Volunteer Service (AVS). International Service Employees (ISE), Archives, Statistics, and Research (ASTR). Secretariat work can be divided into two categories: technical and missionary. The technical involves policy, agenda, minutes, committees, commissions, church structuring, statistics, system, missionary processing, liaising, peacekeeping, surveys, etc. Missionary work includes promoting mission, recruiting, strategizing, training, mentoring, missionary care, problem solving, etc.

Six people attended the meetings from the NSD: the secretariat team, which included Yutaka Inada, executive secretary; Song SungSub (Paul), associate secretary; En Hui (Esther) Ke, administrative secretary; and Lee HyungKyung (Caryn), administrative secretary, and the International Personnel Resources and Services (IPRS) team, German Lust, treasurer, and Cho KyungJa (Lily), chief accountant.

We greatly appreciated the GC Secretariat team's preparation and well-organized fruitful training programs as well as the warm hospitality. Following the GC secretariat advisory meetings, the NSD will hold our Division secretariat advisory from May 31 to June 2, 2016. Participants will be lecturers from the GC secretariat office, and the secretariat personnel at the NSD/unions/local conferences/mission and the AVS coordinators are invited.



Health Ministries Director

The Health Ministries Department World Advisory was held from March 13 to 24, 2016, at the General Conference (GC) headquarters, with Health Expo and Mission Training. Several scholars presented on modern health issues, such as mental health, addiction, smoking, and lifestyle disease. After the presentations, participants had the opportunity to discuss the health issues. The health ministries directors from the 13 divisions gave reports regarding each division's situation, mission challenge, and future health ministry plan.

There was also a Health Expo and Mission Training regarding practical health methods in approaching people who do not believe in God. The GC health ministries team invited the global mission team to include health with mission strategy and to serve with strong mission spirit. The GC health ministries team emphasized comprehensive health ministry for the next five years. Through the meetings and training, participants realized that health is not just talk but action and that comprehensive health ministry can be a powerful tool for reaching people.

Family Ministries

• Family Ministries exists to extend the redemptive ministry of Christ to relationships in families... [It exists] to bring a message of hope to families." These were some of the words that the General Conference family ministries (FM) director and associate director, Willie and Elaine Oliver, shared with the family ministries world leaders at the world advisory from March 6 to 10. Elaine Oliver, associate director for the General Conference (GC) family ministries, mentioned that "The goal of postmodernism is individual fulfillment... a cultural shift where we move from a communitybased society to an individualistic

society. What we are seeing is that we allowed so many of these traits and characteristics of the prevailing society to enter into our homes without really thinking about it. Family Ministries is constantly balancing two ideas: What are the ideals that we uphold and how do we minister to people where they are?"

The advisory meeting was an inspiring time for devotional thoughts, fellowship opportunities, brainstorming, discussions and strategic planning, as well as presentations and training such as the Prepare-Enrich program. The advisory was greatly enriched by the presence of retired family ministries directors, Ron and Karen Flowers, who shared thoughts of encouragement, faithfulness and guidance on the mission of family ministries.

During this new quinquennium, the family ministries department will be celebrating 100 years of existence. "Reaching Families for Jesus" is the theme to lead all the endeavors of this department. During the opening meeting, Elder Ted Wilson, GC president, emphasized that the work will not be finished unless everyone is involved, and he added that "it starts with family, the basic factor of society." We pray that each family will be involved in reaching their own children as well as other families for the Kingdom of God.

Planned Giving and Trust Services

The 2016 Planned Giving and Trust Services (PGTRS) World Advisory was held from February 28 to March 3, 2016, at the General Conference (GC) Headquarters.

All the world division PGTRS directors participated in the advisory along with the GC PGTRS directors and staff. On the first day of the advisory, we reviewed the mission, vision and purpose of this important PGTRS ministry, reminding ourselves that God is the owner of all things both tangible and intangible and that all human beings are stewards of God's assets.

The Planned Giving Ministry is a way that every Seventh-day Adventist member can be involved in the mission of the Seventh-day Adventist Church to reach the world for Jesus Christ and to inspire the members and friends of the church



to fulfill their passion for ministry and to lead them to the recognition of God's ownership of all, by facilitating ways to leave a legacy through present and future giving.

We discussed many important agenda items, and various departments and services at the GC, including the Stewardship Department, Adventist Risk Management, and the Office of General Counsel, shared presentations. Our world church leader Elder Ted Wilson joined the meeting and spent a few minutes sharing his personal conviction of the important ministry of Planned Giving and Trust Services. All division department directors presented their reports from the past five years and shared their plans for the next five years.

On the second day of the advisory,

we went to the Mount Aetna Conference Center to continue our discussion and to visit the Nature Center and have lunch with the donor who shared with the participants how he had turned the land into a Nature Center and how he had helped with the local church to set up a pipe organ. It was amazing to see the miraculous way God is working in the lives of these faithful church members. Because of their planned giving and dedication to the church, many people have been blessed.

As the advisory drew to a close, the participants recommitted their lives to God. They clearly understand that this is their responsibility and assignment. The Planned Giving and Trust Services ministry is to assist Seventh-day Adventist members in their final act of stewardship.





Every five years, the Stewardship Ministries Department of the General Conference (GC) convenes division directors for an advisory meeting. They listen to reports from the different divisions and share ideas on how to move forward during the next five years.

This year, the Stewardship Ministries Department Advisory, which met at the GC, from March 6 to 10, 2016, was especially meaningful. Although most division directors are placed in charge of only one department, other directors are given multiple responsibilities. The GC decided to pay the salary and travel budget of all division stewardship ministries directors for the next three and a half years granted they serve in the Stewardship department only. Nine divisions appointed full time Stewardship directors, the North American Division appointed an associate director, and the Inter-American

Division and Northern Asia-Pacific Division appointed two full time associate directors with a full time director.

Ted Wilson, world church president, introduced this unusual emphasis, saying, that "every division level will produce a renaissance that our relationship with God and with His work is so vital to the finishing of God's work that every church member will resonate with this incredible understanding that what I am and what I have is all due to God's grace and power in my life."

Pastor Paul Smith, who was appointed to be the first GC associate stewardship director in 1967 and later served as GC stewardship director, was invited as one of the guest speakers. He shared a story of Elder Robert H. Pierson, the GC president at the time. One day, Elder Pierson requested that the general vice presidents whose offices were next to his move their office rooms further away. He then placed the stewardship director in an office which used to be occupied by the GC vice presidents. This shows how important the world church leader considered the role of stewardship ministries in the church and it has not diminished since then.

The world division directors shared division programs and ideas with other division directors. They also invited everyone to help with their own division stewardship meetings.

Elder Williams Costa, GC communication director, emphasized the necessity and importance of word, prayer, and the Holy Spirit at the devotional every morning.

During the advisory, participants discussed many different items, such as the internet and SNS mission, production of Christian movies and documentaries, the Creation movie, smart devices mission, and Adventist News Network. Each division also presented a report on communication ministry. Pastor Han SukHee, NSD communication director, reported on the public relations and media ministry of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD) and received positive

feedback.

The 2016 Youth Ministries World Advisory was held from February 29 to March 4, 2016, at the Mt. Aetna Campsite, located near the General Conference (GC) Headquarters. The youth directors from the 13 divisions and from the GC gathered together to set practical goals for the youth

department from a global point of view.

The department adopted "Pass It On" as a strategic theme for the next five years, highlighting their resolve to empower youth. The yearly emphases for global youth ministries were also determined: 2016 – Refocusing (Refresh); 2017 – Reformation; 2018

Europe was chosen as the destination for the 2018 Global Youth Ministries Congress with the view of taking young people of the world church back to the heart of the Reformation. The year 2017 marks 500 years since the Reformation, which started with Martin Luther nailing the 95 theses on the doors of the church in Wittenberg, Germany. The congress will be held from July 30 to August 4, 2018, in Messe Stuttgart, Germany. The Sabbath School and Personal Ministries (SS/PM) Advisory was held at the General Conference (GC) Headquarters from March 7 to 11, 2016, and the Sabbath School Bible Study Guide curriculum committee met from March 14 to 15, 2016.

The advisory was inspiring, informative, and innovative, seeking to implement the GC's suggested plans and initiatives included in the Reach the World strategic plan for this new quinquennium.

Dr. S. Joseph Kidder, professor at Andrews University Theological Seminary, gave an inspiring presentation. He said that one of the greatest hindrances to God's work is our attitude and that the most important ingredient for church growth is having a winning attitude based on faith and trust in God and that nothing is more important than faith-based optimism.

He emphasized the Big Four factors, which are the secrets to a thriving church family, and promised that no matter who you are, the Big Four will equip you to powerful ministry and evangelism.

1. Bible Study: Build your own faith first. Study God's action in the Bible and in history.

2. Live Faith: Demonstrate faith in word and action, and talk about the incredible power of God.

3. Vision: Instill in the congregation a vision of God's greatness through sermons, testimonies, slogans, banners, and songs.

4. Enthusiasm: Build an enthusiastic congregation with a healthy self-esteem that believes all

things are possible (*The Big Four*, 36).

During the advisory meetings, we received reports from the 13 Divisions'' SS/PM and discussed the Big Four of SS, Total Membership Involvement (TMI), SS curriculum for children, youth, young adults, and adults as well as Correspondence Bible Schools.

"The Sabbath-school should be one of the greatest instrumentalities, and the most effectual, in bringing souls to Christ. Our Sabbath School workers need to be especially imbued with the Spirit of Christ" (*Testimonies on Sabbath School Work*, 20). May God continue to bless you abundantly in His service!

I was a hippie—lost in the city of New York—but God was looking for me. And He found me. Here is my story.

I was born out of wedlock. My mother was only 14 years old when she gave birth to my oldest sister. My father was just 15—two teenagers without marriage or life skills.

They tried to make a go of it, but it didn't work. My young father had a roving eye and was soon looking at other women. He and my mother tried to build a home together, but it was over in a couple of years.

I have 17 siblings from different mothers, the result of a totally dysfunctional home. By the time my first birthday rolled around, my parents had split up. We were then living in the Dominican Republic. My father decided to move to New York City, and he took me with him.

Because I was his firstborn son, he was proud of me and wanted me to be just like him—an excellent dancer, lover, free spirit and pleasure seeker. I was on my way to fulfilling his wishes, because I, too, wanted to be just like my father. My father took me to places that were forbidden to minors and trained me to be just like him.

Because of my immoral upbringing, statistically I had no chance of making it in life. In fact, I should have been dead a long time ago like many of my friends. The odds of survival were against me. I was lost in New York City, participating in all the pleasures of life, but without God, without a future and without hope. Just another lost soul in the Big Apple.

I had no interest in religion, the Bible, or in God. In fact, there wasn't enough room in my life for God. And although I had everything that a young man could desire in a big city, without the guidance and example of a good father or mother, I felt empty. The music, the parties, the friends and women, the drinks, drugs and dance halls—all were not enough to quench the thirst for something different in my soul.

I started sensing a need for something bigger than me—bigger than the stimulation of the carnal senses. I started to feel a longing for something, but I didn't know what. I couldn't describe it. Trapped in a vicious cycle, I just kept repeating the same mistakes of my father, who'd learned them from his father, who'd probably learned them from his father. According to my genealogy, the odds were stacked against me, and my future looked bleak, my destiny hopeless.

But God had not forgotten me-he had a plan for my life. One day, an ex drug dealer named Andy invited me to his home in Manhattan. I had visited him before, and we were good friends, but this time I noticed something different. He seemed happier, peaceful, nice. His face had a glow that I'd never seen before. He invited me to dinner with his family-his third wife by now. He served me something that looked like meat, but it was not meat. He gave me cheese that was not cheese, and milk that was not the actual milk I was used to. It was strange. I thought he had gone crazy with all the drugs he'd ingested over the years.

I asked him, "What's going on?"

He replied, "I've been converted. I now belong to Jesus. I don't do drugs anymore. I read the Bible and go to church."

When I heard that, I started laughing. "You mean to tell me that after all these years selling drugs and being a bad boy on the streets of NYC, all of a sudden you're religious? You gotta be kidding me!"

Andy smiled and said, "I love Jesus, and I love you." Then he showed me a book titled *The Desire of Ages*.

I was curious, so I started reading it and fell in love with Jesus. I went to church with Andy a couple of times, but I was still struggling with drugs. I finally told my friend, "Thank you very much, but church is not for me."

Two years passed after that first visit to a Seventh-day Adventist church. One night, as I was driving home after leaving the dance floor of a ballroom at 4 a.m., I suddenly heard a voice say, "*Read the Bible*." And then the voice said, "*Find a church*." I thought, Now I get it. This is God calling me to be His child!

I was startled to say the least! When I was a child growing up in the Dominican Republic, the parish priest, Rafael Fernandez, had given me a Bible with the words inscribed, "So that you will never forget your friend, or God."

Unfortunately, over the years I'd forgotten my friend, and worse yet, I'd forgotten God. I'd forgotten the gifted Bible, too. For years it had sat hidden away from view gathering dust in a junk drawer.

But God had not forgotten me. *Read the Bible? Really?* I had never done that in my life!

That voice could not have come at a more appropriate time. I had been feeling sad, tired and dejected. For some time now I had felt like escaping life, and especially my past. Some events in my life had shaken me up. Two of my friends had died. One had jumped from the 35th floor of a New York City skyscraper. The other was stabbed while negotiating a drug deal.

Now the voice persisted, "*Read the Bible*." It was not an audible voice, but the impression on my mind and heart was so clear that I hadn't the slightest doubt it was the voice of God.

I obeyed that voice, and in the morning I went out looking for a church. I found several, but wasn't impressed with any of them. So I drove back home, parked my car and started walking to my apartment. That's when a man approached me and said, "Young man, can I give you these magazines?"

I had never seen the man before. He was a total stranger. He gave me two magazines which I immediately recognized as religious. I realized this was no coincidence. I thought, *Now I get it. This is God calling me to be His child*! It was as if a ray of light had come into my life, and suddenly everything became clear. I immediately asked the man four questions:

1. Are you a Christian? He replied, "Yes."

2. Are you a Seventh-day Adventist? Again, his reply was, "Yes."

3. When is the next time you're going to church? "Next Wednesday," came the reply.

4. Can you take me with you? "Of course," he said.

And that's how I walked into the Patterson Seventh-day Adventist Church. The year was 1974. I asked the pastor, "What do I need to do to be baptized?" I needed no convincing. God had called me, and I was ready.

The pastor gave me a set of Bible lessons. I took them all and told him I would study them on my own. I did so in record time, and when he tested me on the lessons, I knew all the answers. I was baptized without any formal Bible studies, but with a firm understanding and conviction of the truth.

The Bible has a transforming power that few recognize. Throughout the history of Christianity, men and women have recognized that transforming power. Not in the Bible itself—it's only ink and paper—but in its content. It's God's Word. Perhaps that's why Jesus said, "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God" (Matthew 4:4).

Pastor Lee MyunJu Reappointed as President of **Bangladesh Union Mission**

On February 8, 2016, the Southern Asia-Pacific Division executive committee voted to reappoint Pastor Lee MyunJu as the president of Bangladesh Union Mission. Pastor Lee, who was called to Bangladesh in May 2013, began his second term.

"As far as big projects are concerned, an Adventist nursing school is now under construction. We are praying for the establishment of an Adventist hospital here in Bangladesh," said Pastor Lee. As a missionary from Korea, he will also encourage and help other Korean Adventists to do mission work outside of Korea.

Pastor Lee was the first Korean Adventist to be elected as a union president outside of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division territories. He has promoted seven major projects for evangelization in Bangladesh as part of the celebration of the centennial anniversary of Bangladesh mission work. He has also tried his best for church growth despite the poor missionary environment.

Bangladesh is definitely a challenging field as the total number of registered Adventists is 30,000 (1 Adventist per 5,000 people) and financial self-sufficiency is only about 20%.

After completing a one-week trip in Hong Kong, we flew to Beitun District, Taiwan, to help with an evangelistic series at Beitun Adventist Church. When we arrived in Beitun, a dark gray sky and strong winds were waiting for us.
