## “The Earth Remains Forever”

“Generations come and generations go, but the earth remains forever” (Ecclesiastes 1:4).

### The Earth Remains Forever

As mentioned in Ecclesiastes, generations come and go. Time periods come and go. Eras come and go. In the past, time periods were classified as 30 years, a one-generation cycle; this has been shortened by about five to ten years in the rapidly changing world. However, the key to the verse is not generations coming and going, but the phrase, “the earth remains forever.”

Even though generations come and go, even though time comes and goes, and even though people, cultures, and circumstances change, there is one thing that remains unchanged—the earth. How does the earth remain forever? The end of the earth is undeniable and inevitable, and it is our common understanding that the earth will finally be shaken, devastated, and ruined. Then, why does the Bible say that the earth remains forever? What does the earth refer to in this verse? Does it contain a special spiritual meaning in addition to our common concept of the earth?

### The Place for Soul-Winning

Matthew 24:14 is one of the most famous Bible verses emphasizing world mission. “And this gospel of the kingdom will be preached in the whole world as a testimony to all nations, and then the end will come” (Matthew 24:14).

The whole world mentioned above means all the earth. The earth is the place where the heavenly gospel must be spread. The earth is, so to speak, the target of the mission God has given to us. This is the earth written about in Acts 1:8, “you will be my witnesses to the ends of the earth.” In other words, the earth is the place where people should be saved, the place where God’s work should be done, and the place where the Three Angels’ Messages should be spread in the last days.

Although time passes and generations change, there is something fundamental

that has never changed. That is the unique identity of the Adventist Church. Of course, the identity includes many things, including the Sabbath, the Heavenly Sanctuary, the health message and other truths, but we can summarize it with these words: mission and evangelism. Evangelism is the reason for the existence of the Adventist Church, and it is also its historical, philosophical and biblical foundation. The evangelistic spirit, which is the fundamental spirit of the church, has never changed despite the transition of time, thoughts and trends.

“The church is God’s appointed agency for the salvation of men. It was organized for service, and its mission is to carry the gospel to the world” (AA, 9).

“The gospel commission is the great missionary charter of Christ’s kingdom. The disciples were to work earnestly for souls, giving to all the invitation of mercy. They were not to wait for the people to come to them; they were to go to the people with their message” (AA, 28).

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# Vision One Million 2020

Mission First in All Activities to Reach the World

Its mission is to share the news of mission activities and views of mission of the NSD with the world church so that the Second Coming of Jesus Christ will be hastened.

28 covered 24 Bible topics—from creation to salvation, from Daniel 2 to Revelation 13, from the Sabbath to the prophetic gift—in a logical sequence that was called The Story of Hope. Relatively few unbelievers came, an average of 17 each night, but about 100 members also came, a higher-than-expected attendance.

By the end of the series there were two notable results. Thirteen of the 17 non-members mentioned made the decision to be baptized, and 10 of them were baptized during the series. Even though it is challenging to do evangelism in Japan, clearly, more people than many expect may respond to the Gospel as long as they are regularly exposed to the wonders of God’s Word. Each of the new believers was assigned a trained spiritual mentor who made the commitment to care for the new member for the next 12 months. Their training included specific visitation objectives and a number of resources for each of the first eight weeks after the new member’s baptism.

The second notable result was the impact it made on the church. The young adults, many for the first time, caught a vision for mission. The older, established members discovered new wonderful insights in God’s Word. One person put it this way: “I’ve been a Seventh-day Adventist all my life, and it’s like I’ve never heard these truths before. How wonderful is God’s plan for us!” Many developed a new routine: engaging with God’s Word five nights a week instead of focusing on work, social media or TV. The pastor was thrilled with what the meetings did for his church: the people were happy, they were united, they developed a burden for outsiders, and they came closer to Jesus!

# A Blessing from God

## Evangelistic Meetings at Amanuma Church

In October 2017, Jesus and His Word were faithfully preached in a span of three weeks in Japan, and the Lord blessed His people in ways many cannot remember happening before.

To begin with, having the board of the Amanuma Church—an institutional church next to the well-respected Tokyo Adventist Hospital—accept the plan of a reaping series lasting more than three weeks is a miracle in itself.

Most churches in Japan are used to one- or two-night meetings for evangelism. In addition, this plan involved considerable outlay of effort and time by three dozen volunteers: translators, cooks, print and media resource people, children’s care, and visitation teams, aside from the ushers, greeters, and musicians.

The series preached by Dr. Ron Clouzet, ministerial association director of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division, from October 6 to

# The Story of the Newly Baptized

**Kai Onodera** grew up in an Adventist home. His parents were faithful to the truth, but Kai never made his surrender to Jesus. Years went by, and it seemed that his best opportunities to join the church were behind him. He married Yoshiya, a woman with no Christian background. Nevertheless, influenced by working with Adventists, he started coming to church in his mid-30s. Still, he successfully resisted every chance to be baptized. Someone asked him to help with the sound system at the church, and he accepted. Thus, he was there, listening to the messages from The Story of Hope. And so was his wife and their son of 11. Kai Onodera kept coming, even when he was not scheduled to help. Ten days after the meetings began, he, his wife, and their son, Ruriko, made the decision to be baptized.

**Yasuhiro Sunada** is a salaryman with the public school system. When he was a child, he was once exposed to the Adventists, and he remembered them. Rha Myunghoon, the pastor of the Amanuma Church, has been holding a service for non-members every Sunday evening. Sunada attended, off and on, for years. He eventually came to the fourth meeting of The Story of Hope and learned about the Sabbath. When he missed the next meeting, a visitation team member took the DVD to him, which was part two of the Sabbath. He returned two Sabbaths later, ready to keep the day holy. An alert church member brought him to the evangelist, who learned the man had a number of questions and offered him a special visit to answer them. They met with the pastor and a translator on the next night. Question after question was answered: on unclean foods, on the pope, on what it takes to join the church, etc. He took notes and listened carefully. The evangelist gave him four more DVDs on key topics he'd missed. Mr. Sunada took the next day off from work to watch the DVDs. He had said that due to his work, he couldn't come except a half hour later to the meetings. But after he watched the DVDs, he was not only there on time, he also started attending the baptismal class. His heart was broken by the love of Jesus. He made a clean break with every habit that would not bring glory to God, and was baptized, an eager new convert, to join the remnant church of God.

**Shoki Kohara** had become unemployed. Waiting at a bus station one day, a mission-minded member of the church gave him a flyer, inviting him to The Story of Hope. Shoki had no Christian background whatsoever. To the member's great surprise, Shoki showed up for the first time on the sixth night, when the speaker spoke about the origin of sin. Shoki came forward on the seventh night to receive Christ as his Savior and Lord, but it was clear there was a struggle in his soul, and good and evil were vying for victory. After a few nights, he finally decided to attend the baptismal class, but with no intention of being baptized. However, the nightly messages and the nightly classes had their intended effect: they transformed a man who had walked far from God into a disciple of Jesus. Shoki decided to be baptized. On the day of his baptism, one could see in his face the radiant joy of being born again!

**Tadahiro Aratono** is an older man who decided to help a woman who was fleeing from an abusive marriage. She moved in with him. She had become an Adventist just a few years before. They both attended the meetings faithfully, coming a good half hour ahead each night. On the night he gave his heart to Jesus things began to change for him.

Neither he nor his friend was comfortable any longer with their living arrangements. However, what to do! Housing is extremely expensive in Tokyo. He attended the baptismal classes held every night after each meeting. She went with him. She wanted to be faithful to God, and realized their situation could not continue as it was. But their options were very limited. She couldn't move in with her daughter, she thought. We spent hours encouraging them and trying to find a solution God could have for this dilemma. Finally, on the Friday before the last meeting, Mr. Aratono moved his friend out of his house to a hotel. This is an amazing sacrifice by two people in this stage of their lives. Aratono was all smiles on the day of his baptism, certain that God would provide as long as he remained faithful to Jesus.



# Evangelism Myths Shattered in Japan

Japan is well-recognized by the Adventist Church as one of the most difficult countries to evangelize. This is a conviction also widely shared by other Christian denominations. The Adventist Church in Japan has very few young people, the membership is decidedly older, the churches are generally small, many pastors do not prioritize evangelism, and the work ethic of the Japanese makes it difficult for members to take time to reach out and for the secular Japanese to be interested in our message.

In addition, there are certain general beliefs shared by many regarding evangelism. One of them is that public evangelistic meetings do not work in Japan, that the only way to hope to do outreach is on a personal basis. Another is that any series of meetings that are longer than one weekend are too long, that neither members nor guests would stand for it. A third is that distinctive Adventist doctrines, such as the Sabbath, last-day prophecies, the investigative judgment, the fall of Babylon, or the Spirit of Prophecy, are not subjects that should be

included in public meetings. People are not ready for them. And a fourth myth is that the Japanese take a long time—many months or years—to process truth before they decide to join the church. In other words, evangelism, as practiced in other nations, does not work in Japan.

Recently, the Amanuma Church in Tokyo shattered each one of these myths. They chose to follow every aspect of a field school of evangelism plan that began in January and concluded in October 2017. They participated in evangelistic training, such as personal evangelism, praying for the lost, and giving Bible studies. They reached out to the community through several health seminars. They even engaged in door-to-door work, all staple features of methods used elsewhere. Learning from the school of evangelism, they were ready with scores of book and DVD resources to sell to those attending the *Why God* apologetics mini-series that preceded the main public meetings.

More than a dozen members became part of evangelistic visitation teams, something that called for

a training commitment led by the evangelist twice each week. A registration and attendance team kept track of everyone's attendance and decision made on a nightly basis, which allowed the visitation teams to know how to help non-believers move along in their quest for truth. A baptismal class was established on the 10th of the 24 nights of the series, and the visitation team members encouraged those making decisions to attend.

The Amanuma Church also took prayer seriously. Each of the 40 days leading up to the first day of the evangelistic meetings, 20 or 30 members gathered early in the morning to pray for the meetings. Prayer teams also became involved with prayer-walking sections of the city, asking for the Holy Spirit to be poured upon the people they saw in the streets, the stations, and the stores.

The Lord wonderfully blessed the public meetings, which were held from October 6 to 27. The evangelistic meetings lasted not one or two nights but were three weeks and four weekends long! An average

of 100 to 120 people came each night, and the attendance never dropped. So, myth number two was shattered. Four people came forward when the evangelist invited them to accept Christ for the first time, two of them with no Christian background whatsoever. Pastor Rha MyungHoon began brief baptismal classes after each meeting ended, and people kept coming. The evangelist preached distinctive Adventist messages—24 of them—from the Bible and without apology. Not only did guests respond to the moving of the Holy Spirit through the Word, many of the members expressed that they had never expected to be so richly blessed by such a thorough study of God's Word. Myth number three was shattered.

The evangelistic meetings caused a revival in the church. The members most impacted were young adults and professionals who found new life in Christ! The pastor expressed his joy and wonder at how the Holy Spirit could move through a full-set of messages for more than three weeks! Even though meetings were held five nights a week plus three sessions each Sabbath, people kept gathering around the refreshment tables talking and visiting long

after the meetings were over. Myth number one was shattered. And regarding decisions, another myth was shattered. Every night, the evangelist gave people the opportunity to respond to the message by filling out a response card. There, they could note their spiritual and ethical decisions as well as write questions on the topic. The evangelist answered those questions during several special sessions each week. After the four came up to accept Christ, a dozen chose to keep the Sabbath holy, and others began making decisions for baptism and joining the remnant church. Out of an average of 16 non-Adventist guests that came each night, 13 made the decision to be baptized, and 10 of them were ready by the end of the meetings, a mere three weeks long!

What we're learning from this experience in Japan is that people are people everywhere. The Holy Spirit that works wonders in Kenya, Brazil, or the Philippines can also work wonders in Japan. At the core, all people from any culture have similar needs, fears, and hopes, and the answer is not found in philosophy, entertainment, or superficial religious themes, but the answer is found in the truth of the Bible.

Several of those baptized had not had any Christian background, and yet they were ready to join the people of God right away because they saw that the God of the Bible is the true God of heaven and is the One who sacrificed Himself on their behalf.

There is one more myth likely to be shattered soon. Conventional wisdom indicates that many new converts who come through evangelistic meetings soon leave the church. Research actually shows that more people raised in the Adventist Church leave the church than those who join through evangelism. The last training in this field school was for spiritual mentors assigned to help assimilate new believers in the church. They made a commitment of one year, and they have received careful instruction on what to do the first eight weekly visits after their people were baptized, including resources for the new member each week to help them grow. Outside of Japan, this training guaranteed that at least 90% of the new believers remained and were active in the church. With these Japanese new believers, having demonstrated a radical transformation in their lives, that rate of success may be even higher. Praise the Lord!

# Field School of Evangelism at Amanuma Church

The Amanuma Church is a church with tradition and history. It celebrated its 100-year anniversary in 2014. This church has started many churches and has shared the Three Angels' Messages faithfully with the people. God blessed their progress, and more than 400 people on average attended the worship service on Sabbath some decades ago. However, with the church getting older and changes in society, evangelism became harder and the church grew slowly. The average number of attendants dropped to below 300 in 2012, and this number has been declining year by year.

The declining number of active members is symptomatic of other problems. The most essential of which is the lack of evangelism. Essentially, church members did not understand that evangelism is a mission based on faith. Our church has tried friendship evangelism and various other methods, but unfortunately, they could not find a method that worked well. The church members lost motivation, even though they never lost hope that there would be some effective way to tell others about God

in Japan, a country where evangelism seems hard.

And then, a "Field School of Evangelism" began. The field school is a program, based on a process, for churches to learn and practice proven

ways for evangelism. The field school in Japan started on January 21, 2017, with an orientation meeting, and continued for 10 months, culminating with the harvest evangelistic meeting was done in October 2017.

The various field school of evangelism training seminars were very practical, helping members focus on those who are seeking God specifically. At first, communication between Pastor Ron Clouzet, ministerial association secretary of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD) and field school leader, and the church—and even communication within the church—was challenging, and it was not easy for our church members to fully understand what the field school was all about.

However, the pre-harvest meetings in September and the harvest evangelistic meetings in October were really blessed, and 10 of 16 non-member guests were baptized at the end of the meetings. Three more made the decision to be baptized in the future. At first, we could not see how the things we had learned were related to the harvest meetings, but we gradually began to understand how things were connected, and we were able to serve others with joy and enjoyment.

We have been doing evangelistic meetings every year, but this time we learned how important it is to form relationships as church members communicate with seekers and guests. By having a registration and attendance team, we could focus more on each soul that needs salvation. At this meeting, church members asked seekers how they felt about the meetings and were able to engage with them effectively because of the training.

As we reflect on the process we went through, we can see three important things that God taught.

First of all, evangelism is obedience to God's command. I used to think that doing evangelism was a special activity only for people who have strong faith. However, I learned that doing evangelism is being obedient to God and is essential for our faith to grow.

Second, God is the one doing evangelism. Of course, human

beings are the ones who carry out the mission, but only God makes it possible for this to be successful. For example, when we needed financial support, a person who came to the church for the first time gave our church about nine thousand dollars. When we didn't have any interests, God sent us people who were seeking God.

Third, we need to do evangelism in God's way. Until today I thought there was a special Japanese way since we have a very different culture, and so instead of trying, we just worried about it. However, we

realized that the ways of evangelism were not the problem. We learned that we should boldly do evangelism in God's way. He has the answer.

We really learned about God through this process. We learned what it means to believe in God and rely on Him. We would like to give ourselves to future outreach, believing that love for God and others will bring us the best way to do evangelism. I thank everyone for their involvement and praise God who taught us through this field school of evangelism.

# Report from the GC Annual Council

The 2017 Annual Council of the General Conference (GC) of the Seventh-day Adventist Church was held from October 5 to 11, 2017, with the theme “Faithfulness to His Word.” During the council, *Sola Scriptura*, which means “Bible only,” was often referred to as an important foundation of our faith. This is because 2017 is the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, and *Sola Scriptura* is one of the five key beliefs of the Reformation. The other four are *Sola Fide* (faith alone), *Sola*

*Gratia* (grace alone), *Solo Christo* (Christ alone), and *Soli Deo Gloria* (to the glory of God alone).

Before the annual council, GC and Divisions officers visited the footprints of our pioneers who built the foundation of the Seventh-day Adventist movement. Adventist scholars have lectured at many historical sites. This study tour was not only a learning experience but a revival experience as well. At Hiram Edson’s farm, which is the theological birthplace of the Sanctuary truth, Dr. Jo Ann Davidson, Old Testament scholar at Andrews University, gave a lecture about the Sanctuary doctrine. We were all richly blessed by her passionate preaching.

On the evening of October 6, GC president Ted Wilson, officially announced the soon retirement of Dr. Jairyong Lee and his wife. He presented flowers and a token of appreciation for Dr. Lee’s 14 years of service as president of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD). The new president of the NSD, Dr. Kim SiYoung, was introduced to the GC Executive Committee as one of the Adventist world church leaders. As a Division president, he is also accepting the duties and requirements of a GC vice president.

The annual council highlighted the discussion on the “Mission in

Unity” document. The background of the document comes from the aftermath of the voting down of the women’s ordination proposal at the 2015 San Antonio General Conference session. Following nearly six hours of discussion and debate, a majority of the members of the Executive Committee voted to send the document back to the Unity in Mission Oversight Committee for further review.

At the close of the council, Elder Ted Wilson appealed to the members to stay united for mission, as he presented two quotations from the spirit of prophecy.

Confidence in the Seventh-Day Adventist Organization Reaffirmed:

“We cannot now step off the foundation that God has established. We cannot now enter into any new organization, for this would mean apostasy from the truth” (*Selected Messages 2*, 390).

“I am instructed to say to Seventh-day Adventists the world over, God has called us as a people to be a peculiar treasure unto Himself. He has appointed that His church on earth shall stand perfectly united in the Spirit and counsel of the Lord of hosts to the end of time” (*Selected Messages 2*, 397).

The 2017 Annual Council of Japan Union Conference (JUC) was held from November 19 to 21, 2017, at the JUC Tachikawa office. Some leaders of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD), including president Kim SiYoung, executive secretary Yutaka Inada, treasurer German Lust, assistant to the president Joo MinHo, associate treasurer Lyu DongJin, education and Sabbath School and Personal Ministries director Richard Sabuin, youth ministries director Kim NakHyung, and Sabbath School and Personal Ministries honorary associate director Akeri Suzuki joined the meeting. The morning worship talks given by the NSD leaders were spiritually encouraging and motivating for the attendees. During the council, we were able to hear evangelism reports of the past year from each of the conferences, its departments, and institutions.

### All Japan 2018 Maranatha

There was a report regarding next year's All Japan 2018 Maranatha evangelistic meetings scheduled for May 2018. Currently Japan has 94 organized churches nationwide, and JUC plans to have more than 160 simultaneous evangelistic series, which is more than 1.5 times the number of organized churches in Japan! In other words, the evangelistic series will be held not just at churches, but at companies, small groups, and institutions.

Rha Myunghoon, associate pastor at Amanuma Church, the biggest church of all the Adventist churches in Japan, gave a report regarding the evangelism field school that was conducted this past year at the church. At the Amanuma Church, NSD ministerial association director Ron Clouzet conducted field school training from January of this past year. From September to October, 29 evangelistic meetings were conducted, and 10 baptisms were

given as a result. The last time Japan conducted this many consecutive evangelistic meetings in such a short span of time has been at least decades ago. Through the Amanuma Church experience, we were able to confirm that holding consecutive evangelistic meetings is still an effective method of evangelism even in this modern Japanese culture. It was a good preparation and confirmation for JUC, which is expected to hold the Maranatha meetings in 2018.

### International Mission Congress

NSD youth ministries director Kim NakHyung shared plans regarding the International Mission Congress that will be held in August 2018. From Japan, we plan to have all of the JUC workers and all of the pastors nationwide attend the program. As Japan gets involved with intense mission efforts, we hope that many more people will decide to attend the program and be inspired to do more mission work.

### 2020 Tokyo Olympics

In less than 3 years, Japan will host the August 2020 Tokyo Olympics with many visitors from around the world. The JUC would like to use this great opportunity to promote the Seventh-day Adventist Church and share the hope that is in Jesus Christ our Lord. At the JUC meeting, we have officially voted to seriously think and prepare for special evangelistic plans to execute in the upcoming Tokyo Olympics.

At the JUC Annual Council, we have many business-like reports and agenda items to cover as well, but we do our best to emphasize evangelism reports and prayer throughout the meetings. Japan has a population of about 120 million and fewer than 1% are Christians. Of the 1% who are Christians, only about 15,000 are Seventh-day Adventists. Please continue to pray that the everlasting gospel of Jesus Christ will speedily be shared throughout the country of Japan.

The Chinese Union Mission (CHUM) held its 2017 annual council on December 5 and 6, 2017, at the Tsuen Wan Adventist Hospital, Hong Kong. Delegates from the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD), headed by its newly elected president Kim SiYoung, along with Hong Kong-Macao Conference staff and institutional workers, and the representatives from the UT (Unorganized Territory), attended the two-day meeting.

All the attendees were blessed with good reports from different CHUM departments, ministries and its affiliated institutions. By the end of November, 300 evangelistic meetings were held across the CHUM territory. The number of people in the audience reached 80,000. More than 3,400 people were baptized in 2017. The charitable work of the church was also strong. Hong Kong Adventist Hospital helped with a fund-raising lunch in May with the theme “Women of Hope.” A total of 350 USD was raised. The development department of CHUM, under the directorship of Audrey Folkenberg, collected nearly one million US dollars from donors worldwide. CHUM staff participated in local volunteer services for more than 250 hours.

For evangelism in 2018, a new book, *The Power of Hope*, was dedicated by a special ceremony led by Kim SiYoung and Robert Folkenberg, Jr., president of CHUM. The Adventist Church plans to distribute the book to the public for outreach in 2018.

Another memorable event was the dedication service for the newly renovated CHUM office located in Shatin, Hong Kong. On the morning of December 6th, all delegates were invited to tour the new office, listening to the history of the office and appreciating the need for renovation. Pastor Kim SiYoung prayed, asking God to

## KUC Annual Council Presents Goals for the Next Year

The Korean Union Conference (KUC) held its Annual Council at SDA Education Auditorium from November 13 to 15, 2017. The goals for next year, including 250,000 church membership, 63,000 average Sabbath attendance, 5,500 baptisms, and cultivation of 7 churches were presented. The delegates said together in chorus, “Based on solid faith that people with mission will surely triumph, we should humbly place our eyes upon Jesus only so that we can accomplish the world mission. Under the motto of ‘Sharing Member, Serving Church,’ we will do our best to strengthen local churches.”

According to the KUC annual report, as of September 2017, the total number of Adventist members is 252,225 with an average attendance of 57,069, which is only 1/4 of church membership. This means that churches have many lost members, so particular management on backsliders is needed. The total number of churches, companies, and groups is 821, and there are 881 full-time ministers serving the church.

“As what we have accomplished seemed impossible at first, we are now facing many seemingly impossible challenges. However, God is an expert in making the impossible possible. Thus, we have no reason to be afraid of those challenges. All we can do is to trust in Jesus Christ,” said Hwang ChunKwang, KUC president.

## Sahmyook University Holds a Forum on Martin Luther’s Reformation

The theology department at Sahmyook University held a forum commemorating the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther’s Reformation on September 1, 2017. The department aimed to consider its historical significance as well as to ruminate upon the spirit of reformation.

Michael Campbell, associate professor of Adventist Studies at the Adventist International Institute of Advanced Studies (AIAS), gave a presentation under the theme of “*Sola scriptura* (Scripture alone).” He shed light on the religious heir of Luther’s Reformation to the Adventist Church, emphasizing that the Adventist church is rooted in religious faith against Middle Age darkness.

Bae DeokMan, professor at Nehemiah Institute for Christian Studies, presented a study on John Wesley’s soteriology. He talked about how Luther’s Protestant Reformation was inherited to Wesley.

In his presentation on Genesis 4:1, Ha GyeSang, professor at the theology department at Sahmyook University, reviewed Luther’s interpretation on the Bible verse along with linguistic analysis.

In addition, speakers dealt with subjects, such as “Similarities between Anabaptist and the Adventist



Church,” “Luther’s Social Participation,” “Ellen White’s View on Luther,” etc.

Citing *Rediscovering Martin Luther*, Kim SungIk, president of Sahmyook University, said in his welcome remarks, “Ask questions if things are difficult to understand on your conscience; Revolt against false authority; Communicate with one another by sharing gospel.” At the forum, the attendees were able to reconfirm where the theology of the Adventist Church should be headed by reviewing the history of Martin Luther’s Reformation.

# China Sanitarium Leaders' Conference

He is committed to spending special time in prayer every day at the prayer garden. He climbs the stairs to the prayer garden, 65 steps, twice a day. The challenges of leading the school are great. Principal Han KiTae realizes that he cannot bear the leadership responsibility with his own wisdom and strength. Praying to God has become his source of wisdom and strength, and he does this at a special time and at a special place. All the teachers know what he is doing.

Almost all Sahmyook schools in Korea have a prayer garden where students, teachers and administrators may go to spend special time in prayer. Youngnam Sahmyook Academy is one of those schools. In the interviews with teachers and students during an AAA accreditation visit to that school, many testified about the exemplary practice of the principal.

Spiritual life is one of the 10 aspects evaluated in the Adventist Accrediting Association (AAA) accreditation visits, including philosophy and mission and leadership. The purpose is to make sure that all Adventist schools maintain and uplift the identity of Adventist education.

It is very pleasing to see Bible verses posted in prominent places at our Sahmyook schools in Korea: in classrooms, in hallways, at the dormitory, in the library, and even in the cafeteria. When asked if they were familiar with those Bible texts, the students at Youngnam knew many of the verses by memory.

Then I met three non-Adventist (even non-Christian) students. “Do you have a Bible?” I asked them.

“Yes, we do,” they replied.

I followed up with a question. “Who gave you the Bible?”

“We bought it,” they replied enthusiastically.

“Do you read your Bible?” I was curious.

“Yes, we do,” they confirmed.

“When?” I inquired.

“We bring it to our classroom every morning and read it,” they explained.

Adventist schools are a place where young people can be shaped and influenced to follow God. The challenges are big! But God is great and He is greater than all the problems and challenges. It is by relying on Him that we can stand firm and move forward, doing our best for the Lord through Adventist education. Spiritual leadership and the exemplary lives of leaders and administrators play a very important role. This, of course, includes the prayer habit of Principal Han, who goes to the prayer garden, 65-step stairs, twice a day, to pray to the Lord.

# KUC Sends 72 Missionaries Overseas in 2017

According to the report on overseas missions by the Korean Union Conference (KUC) administration during the KUC Annual Council, the number of Korean ministers who have been sent abroad is 59. Among them, 43 were sent as Pioneer Mission Movement missionaries. There are also thirteen 1000 Missionary Movement (1000MM) missionaries so that the total number of overseas missionaries from KUC is 72. Twelve missionaries are working in Taiwan, and the others are working in the Philippines, South America, Europe, Middle East and many other places to spread the Three Angels' Messages to the ends of the earth.

"It is encouraging that many foreign countries are asking for the service of Korean ministers. If the Korean Adventist church strengthens its unique mission of world mission and supports foreign mission fields, it will hasten the second coming of Jesus through the participation of many more pastors in world mission work," said KUC administration.

Meanwhile, 124 missionaries from foreign countries are serving in Korea. All 74 1000MM missionaries and 49 Adventist Volunteer Service workers are working at SDA Education. Two PMM missionaries are serving in East Central and West Central Korean Conferences, respectively.

Moreover, the number of foreign people who attend international churches in Korea is about 460. The Ansan Multicultural Church has about 120 members, and Filipino Church has 95 members. Seventy-three members attend the Daerim Church, which is for Korean-Chinese and North Korean defectors. Thirty-eight members are registered at the Seoul Korean-Chinese Church and 18 members from North Korea are at the Hanbit Shelter Church. The Gasan Foreigner Church for Cambodians has 56 foreign members, and Onam Foreigner Church has about 30 Indian members. About 20 members continuously attend New Life Mongolian Church, and there are 15 members at Yongsan Japanese Church. As Korea is considered a land of opportunity, about 2,260,000 foreigners, which is 4.5% of the Korean population, stay in Korea. However, the ratio of Adventist members to total foreigner population is only 0.0002%. Thus, each conference and church should develop positive mission strategies for multicultural families and foreigners staying in Korea.



# Health Seminar in Taiwan

Dr. Choi YoungIl, health ministry director of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD), led a health seminar in Taiwan from August 25 to 27, 2017, with the title of “We are a medical missionary.” A special seminar was held at Taichung Church, one of the biggest churches in Taiwan, and Sunghang Church, the Taiwan Adventist Hospital church.

Dr. Choi emphasized that it is very important to clearly understand the Adventist health message. Although our excellent health messages can play a crucial role from place to place as a tool for spreading the gospel, sometimes misunderstood health messages cause people to waver in their faith and put churches at risk. By learning principles of the Adventist health messages and Jesus’ treatment of diseases, seminar attendees can gain confidence in our health messages. Taiwan is one of the top vegetarian countries in the world because of the Taoist and Buddhist population. # Medical Missionary Training in Fukuoka

Participants enjoyed a meaningful time with lectures and discussions on various topics, such as the Seventh-day Adventist Church’s health philosophy and health message, modern medicine, cause and cure of lifestyle diseases, ways of managing mental health, ways of strengthening immunity, Jesus and His healing ministry, purpose of medical mission, etc. A question and answer session was included with each lecture, and participants were very satisfied in finding answers to their questions. Particularly, there are many Japanese suffering from mental disease. Some of the participants were able to receive counsel and learn the principles of cure for the disease.

Medical missionary training programs will be held across Japan in the future. By introducing excellent Adventists health messages to Adventists all over Japan, it is anticipated that Japan church members will pursue healthy lifestyles, and it will lead them to spread the Gospel to many non-believers around them.



A three-day church planting seminar was held from November 28 to 30, 2017, at the Japan Union Conference office in Tachikawa, Japan. Dr. Gerson Santos, associate secretary of the General Conference (GC), led this seminar, and another GC associate secretary, Dr. Karen Potter, and her husband Michael served as lecturers. Other lecturers included Pastor Doug Venn, GC coordinator for Mission to the Cities; Dr. Ronald Kuhn, associate director of the Institute of World Mission; and Greg and Amy Whitsett, who are serving at the Center of East Asian Religions and Traditions, which is based in Bangkok. All of them have rich experiences in mission work and cross-cultural effort. As they conducted the seminar, they considered the cultural differences between Japan and western countries, and at the same time, tried to implement universal principles of mission to the Japanese field.

It can be said that in terms of mission work, people are of more importance than budget or method. What made this seminar unique is that it used a personal approach. At the stage of recruiting seminar participants, Dr. Santos mentioned that under 10 people is ideal and the limit should be 15. Twelve pastors and two conference

presidents and the union director of evangelism participated in the program.

Before the seminar began, every participant was required to complete an online evaluation on spiritual gifts as a church planter as well as other personality analysis. Most of the participants were surprised at how well the results of the evaluation reflected who they are. Everyone has strengths and weaknesses.

The participants were also encouraged to form a ministry team, and they had time to think about what kind of persons he or she needed for making an ideal church planting team. Participants were allowed to bring their spouse if desired, and the spouses also participated in evaluations and interviews from the instructors. This can be considered a very practical approach because church planting work would not be successful without the support of the family.

Dr. Santos clearly emphasized at the seminar that the establishment of the church does not mean growth of a congregation to have their own building and pastor. He said we shouldn't ask where the church is or what time church starts. We should ask where and what time the church will "meet." Actually, some churches meet at

# First Golden Bell Quiz Bowl on Stewardship

On December 2, 2017, twenty-five out of thirty-three churches in the Mongolia Mission (MM) participated in the first Golden Bell Quiz Bowl, which was hosted by the MM Stewardship Department. A total of 101 members gathered together at the Ulaanbaatar (UB) Central Church for the event. The questions were taken from the book, *101 Questions and Answers about Tithes and Offerings*, written by Elder Kwon JohngHaeng, stewardship director of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD).

At the beginning of the week there were only 40 young people who had registered to participate, but by Friday afternoon 89 were listed, and before the program, which began at 3:00 p.m. on Saturday, a total of 101 had registered for the Bowl.

The program started with opening prayer by Pastor Nyansurem from the UB Central Church. The objectives of the program and the contest rules and regulations were shared by the MM stewardship director Angelina Pagarigan, who acted as the facilitator of the program. Church members were encouraged to promote faithful tithe returning and generous giving in their churches after diligently reading and studying the book. MM president Kim YoHan gave his opening remarks followed by a recorded message by Elder Kwon.

All questions were read twice, and the participants were given 20 seconds to answer each question. On the first few questions, the majority answered correctly, but after two hours there were eight contestants that remained who were getting all the answers correct at the same time.

The judges, who were composed of Elder Kim YoHan, MM executive secretary Pastor Bold Batsukh, and MM chief accountant Enkhmaa Arvimed, agreed to give a break to the first eight finalists, and give all who had been eliminated a second chance to join the second level questions. # Korean Adventist Women's Association Holds Love Festival



Korean Adventist Women's Association (KAWA) and Sahmyook University Industry-Academic Cooperation Foundation held a "2017 Love Festival" at Sahmyook University square on September 25 and 26, 2017. This event was held in order to establish a healthy sex culture among undergraduates, to cultivate scientific and practical sexual knowledge, and to promote reproductive

health and birth. Under the theme of "Love," counseling, education, and various activities were offered at the booths.

At the "Triangle of Love" booth, participants learned about their type (intimacy, passion, or devotion) using a survey developed by Dr. Robert Sternberg. At the booth, they also measured the psychological state of a couple.

The "Method of Love" booth provided practical sexual education, including information about the menstrual cycle, childbearing age, use of contraceptive pill and device, and sexual disease prevention.

"Promise of Love" was a booth about breast cancer self-examination. Currently, Korea has one of the highest rates of cervical and breast cancer. What is worse is that the age of onset is getting younger. Instructors taught about fibroma, cancer diagnosis, and cervical cancer vaccine.

Graphic data on the seriousness of low birth and population estimate were displayed at the "Future of Love" booth. Participants thought of advantages of marriage, cause of low birth, and factors changing public perception regarding childbirth plan. They also agreed that it is a common goal for society to make and keep a happy family.

The "Gift of Love" booth introduced processed foods and food additives that cause hormone imbalance. They also offered simply natural foods and their recipes. As young people eat instant and fast food that contain a lot of chemical additives, many of them are suffering from hormone imbalance related diseases, such as menstrual irregularity and subfertility. The booth introduced visitors to natural personal care products and healthy food.

"We need a practical approach to healthy sex. The way to protect our health from contraception and sex diseases should be shared. Not only physical, but also psychological state is important," said Mrs. Lee YoungJa, KAWA president.

Participants expressed their satisfaction about this unusual but useful event. Small group or one-on-one counseling was very effective. It was also good for participants to learn necessary but unfamiliar sexual knowledge through various programs.

KAWA and Sahmyook University are planning to hold this program annually during a longer period and with an expanded budget. Moreover, KAWA will hold this festival at Sahmyook Health University soon.

# 2017 FIELD CONFERENCE ON FAITH AND SCIENCE

The Geoscience Research Institute (a General Conference institution) organized the 2017 Field Conference on Faith and Science for Church administrators. The conference was held in the Western Alps (Italy, France and Switzerland) between June 26 and July 5, 2017. Dr. Jairyong Lee, who was then the president of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD), and German Lust, NSD treasurer, attended the conference together with other world church leaders.

The purpose of the conference was to experience firsthand how the biblical worldview impacts our understanding of nature, learn about the strengths and limitations of historical sciences, acquire a firm grasp of the key concepts that are considered controversial in the faith and science debate, and leave with an energizing appreciation of how nature and Scripture testify of a powerful and good Creator. The conference gave attendees an opportunity to reflect upon God's power as revealed in His creation, by visiting some locations of geological interest. Also, each day, time for discussion and reflection was scheduled in the context of a rich program of lectures covering topics on origins that are of high relevance for the mission of the church. Participants discussed strategies on how to teach, share and lead as biblical creationists.

During the conference, several topics were addressed. One of them, fossils—a record of past life—was discussed on a visit to the Fossil Museum in Monte San Giorgio, Meride, Switzerland, which has well-preserved fossils,

including some marine reptiles. “Sediments and the rocks they form often include the remains of organisms, so fossils provide valuable information on the processes that led to death and fossilization of once living organisms,” said Dr. Ronald Nalin from the Geoscience Research Institute.

Deformation—a record of process—can be observed in the northwestern European Alps which have a history of intense deformation and transformation of rock units. The participants of the conference had the opportunity to see some of this evidence for both stretching and compression of rocks of the earth's crust. As Dr. Ronald Nalin shared, “Rocks can behave as rigid bodies and develop cracks and faults when placed under stress but can also plastically flow and bend, forming folds.”

Intelligent design was an important aspect among many of the presentations. “By the word of the Lord were the heavens made; and all the host of them by the breath of His mouth ... For he spake, and it was done, He commanded, and it stood fast” (Psalm 33:6, 9). Conversations on how we communicate the truth about God as Creator of the universe and life led to an interesting dialogue among the participants on how to share relevant information on this issue, especially among young people, through different types of media.

Other topics covered during the field conference were the theological implications of models on origins; Time, Flood and the geologic column; intelligent design; and scientific revolutions.

In the presentations, the question about how to understand the differences between faith and science arose many times. “God has permitted a flood of light to be poured upon the world in both science and art; but when professedly scientific men treat upon these subjects from a merely human point of view, they will assuredly come to wrong conclusions ... Those who leave the word of God, and seek to account for His created works upon scientific principles, are drifting without chart or compass upon an unknown ocean. The greatest minds, if not guided by the word of God in their research, become bewildered in their attempts to trace the relations of science and revelation” (*Patriarchs and Prophets*, 113).

While we continue to believe in God as the Creator of the universe, we need to be honest in regard to questions that do not necessarily have appropriate answers. It is impossible for human beings to fully understand the creative power of God, and certainly there are many things that were not revealed to us. When we encounter something that as human beings we cannot understand, Deuteronomy 29:29 gives us the key: “The secret things belong unto the Lord our God: but those things which are revealed belong unto us and to our children forever.”

Praise the Lord for so many wonderful things in nature that we can enjoy and that point to a Creator God!

“**B**ut to each one of us grace has been given as Christ apportioned it. So Christ himself gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the pastors and teachers, to equip his people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ (Ephesians 4:7, 11-13).

Jesus, by God's will, has chosen every one of us to become workers for Christ's body, the church. He has given us heavenly gifts to share so that we all may grow mature in faith and in the knowledge of Christ. He has called us, the Golden Angels, to become singing evangelists for the sake of the gospel, and now, one full

year of this singing mission has come to an end.

From November 12 to December 17, 2017, our final mission as the Golden Angels was five weeks of five different evangelistic meetings held in five different places in Taiwan: Taitung, Beitun, Shalu, Douliu, and Pingzhen. At each church, we met many church members, seekers, and also those who came to church for the first time. We mingled with them and shared our experiences in Christ to encourage each one of them. By singing songs, by having conversations with them, and of course, by living our daily lives, we prayed and tried our best to reflect the characteristics of Christ. I sincerely pray that the seed of the gospel that we planted in them will grow in their heart to grow mature

in Christ, that they will all grow to become His workers of the gospel.

I want to mention an activity that we participated in at Shalu Church, called “The Mommy Club.” Shalu Church provided a place for moms who take care of their little children at home to come together and enjoy the program that the church has prepared. This activity was promoted mouth-to-mouth to the mothers at home, and many mothers in town brought their little children to church.

The Golden Angels, this time, didn't concentrate much on singing, but rather, we were basically babysitting for the whole week! To be honest, it was not easy; it was quite hectic and chaotic. But we observed that the mothers and their children were enjoying the program. And each

day as we continued the program, more moms, and even dads, came to Shalu Church to join the Mommy Club.

Soon enough, the church had become a place of social welfare! Shalu Church met the needs of the society. They connected themselves to the people outside and made relationships with them. The church was doing its service for the local people, and those who didn't even know about Jesus were coming to church. Moreover, the continuous work of the church bore fruit through these relationships: one soul received Jesus Christ as her personal Savior and got baptized on Sabbath morning. Now, she and her two children have become members of the Shalu Church.

As I observed these things happen in this church, I learned how important it is for the church to fill the needs of society in order for us to be examples as Christians. Every church should be a social welfare center! Church, the headquarters of evangelism, should focus not only on the inside, but should go out to society and serve them with the heart of Christ, for Jesus has called us to do so.

Jesus has given us gifts for the purpose of service. Let us now go out and reach out to the world with one spirit, one mission, make this world a better place, be united as Christ's body, and grow in fullness of Christ. For this mission, indeed, we need each other.

The five weeks of Taiwan mission is now over; in fact, our one year of Golden Angels ministry is done. I have to say that it has been a journey—a journey of experiencing God. I confess that it was not we who ministered and led the people to Christ, but God has done all things for us for the glory of His name. Hallelujah, praise His name! We give all glory and honor to God, who has used us as His instruments for His mission. This may be our last mission trip as Golden Angels, but we will continue to be missionaries wherever we are and wherever we go.



Now we hold the promise of Christ and His command: "Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely, I am with you always, to the very end of age" (Matthew 28:19-20). Now we will go and continue to live a missionary life.
