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² Be Still, and Know that I am God

"One of those days Jesus went out to a mountainside to pray, and spent the night praying to God" (Luke 6:12). When Jesus was on this earth, He often withdrew from the crowd and went to a solitary place to spend time with His heavenly Father. His priority was to receive heavenly wisdom and power from the Father even though people were looking for Him.

We all know that Jesus is our example of how we should live our Christian life. He shows a good example through His earthly life of how we can successfully overcome our weaknesses and shortcomings. The Bible shows us how Jesus did that in the book of Luke. "But Jesus often withdrew to lonely places and prayed" (Luke 5:16, NIV); "One of those days Jesus went out to a mountainside to pray, and spent the night praying to God" (Luke 6:12). And again, we can read it from the book of Mark. "Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house and went off to a solitary place, where he prayed" (Mark 1:35).

From these Bible verses, we can discover the following things: 1) Jesus often prayed. 2) Jesus prayed alone. 3) Jesus went to a solitary place to pray. 4) Jesus spent long hours praying. 5) Jesus prayed early in the morning. We can

see where, when, and how He prayed.

Even though Jesus was God, the Son himself, He solely depended upon the power of God the Father to heal, cure, and save His people on this earth. He received power from God and performed great miracles to heal the lives of people. Ellen G. White stated, "The lessons of the life of Christ are precious to us. He waited, He worked, He prayed, in behalf of man. He depended upon God, and in His life plans worked with God. He cooperated perfectly with the will of His Father. We need to copy this Pattern in all things" (12LtMs, Lt 87, 1897, par. 2). Mrs. White emphasized that we need to follow and copy the example of Jesus Christ. Jesus prayed and depended upon God, and He followed the will of His Father. In many cases, we have failed to follow Jesus' example. Sometimes, we are too busy with work and travel. We fail to communicate with our God. And that is the reason why we are not always successful in our gospel ministry.

We need to learn how to "be still and know that I am God" (Psalms 46:10). In this part of the Bible, the Psalmist tells us how God is powerful and helpful to us. He says, "God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth give way and the mountains fall into the heart of the sea, though its waters roar and foam and the mountains quake with their surging" (Psalms 46:1-3). In whatever situation we are in, or kinds of difficulties we face, God is always there with us to protect us and strengthen us. He is described as an "ever-present help in trouble." We truly need to trust in this Bible verse. It is because God loves us, and He is an omnipotent God.

Dr. Frank Hasel reminded us during the 10 Days of Prayer, "Our lives are packed to the brim with so many things we want to pursue." It is true. In many cases, we are driven by our worldly desires, which lead us to fall into temptations to disobey God's will. As Dr. Hasel mentioned, we must "intentionally reduce and make room for meaningful, soul-invigorating quiet time with our Creator and Savior." Then, God will come to meet us personally and direct our paths.

Priorities of Faith: 10 Days of Prayer

New Year, Renewed Commitment

The 10 Days of Prayer initiative is a prayer session proposed by the General Conference and provides an excellent opportunity for Seventh-Day Adventists around the world to spend a special time in prayer and meditation of the Word for renewed commitment to the Lord, especially at the beginning of a new year.

10 Special Days at NSD Headquarters

From January 10-20, 2024, the office of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division conducted the 10 Days of Prayer. Every day, people gathered in the auditorium in the morning and sang the theme song, "Fill My Cup, Lord." All participants humbly asked Jesus to come and quench the thirst of their souls. After the songs and prayer, the daily speaker led readings on topics by Dr. Frank Hasel titled:



"Less is More," "The Danger of Being Busy for God," "The Blessing of Waiting," "Grit, Passion, and Perseverance," "The Blessings of the Sabbath," and more. These readings encouraged participants to think deeply about the topics. The directors of NSD led the daily reading and prayer time which proceeded in small groups; on some days, people gathered together by birthday month. People prayed for the four new NSD countries (Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Bangladesh, and Nepal), for churches, for pastors and members, and individuals suffering from difficulties, among other things. After the prayer time, people sang "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms."

Secret Prayer Friends

Because prayer is a communication and outpouring of our hearts' desires to our Lord and Creator, intercessory prayer is a powerful form of praying for others. It is an act of compassion and love, allowing us to care for those around us as the Bible encourages us to "seek the good of others" (1 Corinthians 10:24).

During the 10 days, we were encouraged to spend meaningful time in prayer to develop a closer relationship with the Lord, take an interest in those around us, and offer intercessory prayers for them. Each member of the NSD family drew a name randomly from a box to be their secret prayer friend, someone to think of and pray for. Throughout the program, they were to think of special prayer needs for the person and ask our heavenly Father to look after them and fulfill the desires of their hearts according to His good will. They were also to subtly show their prayer friend that God cares about them and their colleagues in mission.

On the last day, the names of the secret prayer friends were revealed, and each person had an opportunity to

reach out to their partner and talk. Some were seen thanking the other for a little token of love and support. We hope this little exercise of sharing and praying for one another brought us closer as a spiritual community and mission-centered office but also to our Lord, who longs to spend time with us and has special plans and blessings prepared for every one of His precious children.

Renewed Focus on Our Faith and Mission

The 10 Days of Prayer session may have concluded, but our prayers must continue. Remember to spend time sitting at Jesus' feet daily, talking with Him, and reading His Word. If getting to know God personally becomes our life's top priority, we will experience a beautiful journey. "Personal effort for others should be preceded by much secret prayer; for it requires great wisdom to understand the science of saving souls. Before communicating with men, commune with Christ. At the throne of heavenly grace obtain a preparation for ministering to the people" (Prayer, p. 313).

Focusing on our own needs, difficulties, and problems and crying out about our situations in prayer is all too easy. But this is not the only purpose of prayer. Prayer is meant to strengthen our faith. We are encouraged to claim God's promises during our prayer time, taking our eyes off ourselves and our weaknesses and look to Jesus. By looking at Him, we are transformed into His image. Then, we should ask God how our church can serve others.

One of the most vital ministries in the life of the church is teaching children to live gospel-shaped lives; establishing strong theology in our children will set them up to navigate well the increasingly complex society they live in.

Under the theme, "I Will Go with Jesus, Unions and Conference directors from seven countries met on Jan. 21-24, 2024, in Okinawa, Japan for the quinquennium CHM Advisory. The group was inspired for the opportunity to share new concepts in their work of reaching children for Jesus after the pandemic, which heavily impacted the NSD territories. The three areas of emphasis for Children's Ministries, were highlighted by Raquel Arrais, NSD Children's Ministries director, providing new vision, guidance, ideas, and resources for the mission with children.

- •TEACH: To strengthen the learning of biblical principles.
- •REACH: To equip children to reach others.
- •SERVE: To empower children for service and mission.

Dr. Orathai Chureson, GC Children's Ministries director, and Nilde Lust, GC Children's Ministries associate director, shared their expertise, providing clear direction for the work with children in NSD. Reports which covered challenges and plans for the NSD fields were given by each Union, Conference, and Mission leader. Special sessions were devoted to prayer and recommitment to the task.

Leaders discussed important issues, brainstormed, and shared ideas to align the work of Children's Ministries for the years ahead. Dr. Chureson presented the General Conference Children's Ministries Strategic Plan with a special emphasis on Reaching Children and Teens Using Modern Technology; Strengthening Prayer Ministries for Kids; and Children's Mental Health. Nilde Lust shared the vision of Total Member Involvement for children, inviting every child to do something for Jesus. Chureson and Lust also presented the morning devotionals where they stressed the importance of protecting children and to be like Jesus to inspire children to follow Him.

The Sabbath School Teacher's Curriculum was presented where leaders in each field were encouraged to train and enrich Sabbath School teachers through this program.

Praise be to God for the days we spent together as CHM leaders. We finished the advisory spiritually refreshed to lead an effective CHM where God has placed us for such a time as this. The directors returned to their fields equipped and empowered to fulfill their calling as Children's Ministries directors in their territories.

Hiroshi Yamaji, NSD executive secretary, led the dedication ceremony which included a ribbon cutting, and a group photo session.

The special meeting space was named "Jabez Hall." According to NSD President Kim YoHan, "Many ideas and names were suggested, but 'Jabez Hall,' proposed by Byun SeongJun, director of Communication, was selected. This name was inspired by the Jabez project, which facilitated the extension of NSD's territory to include four new countries. I remember that she looked at me and said: "Raquel, you don't need training, you just need great passion and courage." These two words stayed in my mind and inspired my ministry over the years. During my years ministering side by side, I was touched by her strength despite her difficulties. Healthy Heart Happy Life



Hypertension is a major cause of premature death worldwide. It is diagnosed when the systolic blood pressure reading on two different days is 140 mmHg or higher, or the diastolic blood pressure reading on both days is 90 mmHg or higher. An estimated 46% of adults with hypertension are unaware that they have the condition. One of the global targets for non-communicable diseases is to reduce the prevalence of hypertension by 33% between 2010 and 2030 (WHO, 2023).

The NSD Health Ministries department planned a health promotion event for the church leaders during NSD's 2023 Year-end Meeting. Our goal was to increase the awareness of hypertension among leaders of NSD institutions as well as to help them practice healthy lifestyles. We decided to provide a blood pressure measurement service during the meetings, and prepared hand cream as a gift to raise the motivation for delegates who stopped by to get the measurements.

We provided two Omron electronic blood pressure machines, and recorded gender, and age groups for the statistics report. It was not a scientific report but a simple percentage calculation for increasing awareness of hypertension prevalence among church leaders.

The pastors were not used to measuring their blood pressure in public, but we told them we cared about their health and would not judge their health condition. No matter how high or low their blood pressure would be, it was just to remind them and increase their awareness. On the other hand, we found some delegates who had good knowledge of blood pressure and returned multiple times to measure their blood pressure and ask questions. They were happy to get more information to have better health, which was very encouraging to us.

Among the 26 males who came for the blood pressure

measurement, 18 were more than 50 years old and their average systolic blood pressure was 140.7 mmHg. Among them, 50% had a systolic blood pressure higher than 140 mmHg (the national standard determines that systolic blood pressure greater than 140 mmHg is high). If we took the American Heart Association standard which says that systolic blood pressure greater than 130 mmHg is high, then 88.8% of the participants had a high systolic blood pressure. For the male group who were below 50 years old, 25% had a systolic blood pressure higher than 140 mmHg and 62.5% higher than 130 mmHg. This picture shows the prevalence of high systolic blood pressure among the 2023 NSD Year-end Meeting male delegates.

Among 10 females who came for the blood pressure measurement, five of them were above 50 years old and had an average systolic blood pressure of 140 mmHg. Therefore, 40% of the participants in this group also had systolic blood pressure higher than 140 mmHg, while 60% were higher than 130 mmHg. For females below 50 years old, 20% had higher than 140 mmHg, and 40% were higher than 130 mmHg. This data showed that there was a high prevalence of systolic blood pressure among the female delegates as well.

During the meeting, the Health Ministries department reminded the delegates of some steps to manage their blood pressure. They were to have a healthy diet with more vegetables and fruit, reduced salt intake, stress management, regular exercise, enough sleep, while monitoring blood pressure with a joyful heart as good medicine. Moreover, we provided health counseling to those who asked for health advice. It was a wonderful experience to provide this health awareness activity.

We pray for good health for our church leaders and pastors because they play important roles in mission and church development. We hope this health awareness activity will help some pastors and leaders to take the step toward a healthier lifestyle or to monitor their blood pressure regularly. Promoting health is our goal. The Adventist Health Ministries has a motto of Sharing Wholeness, Serving All, "to empower every church to be a center for health and hope."



First Nationwide Pastors' Meeting in Five Years

There are two conferences and one mission under the Japan Union Conference. Each of them holds a pastors' training seminar at least once a year. Due to the impact of Covid-19, the first nationwide pastors' training seminar in five years was held in February 2024, at Kamenokoyama Church, located on the grounds of the Union headquarters.

The lecturers were Dr. Jonas Arrais, NSD Ministerial Association secretary, and Dr. Peter Roennfeldt from Australia. Arrais delivered an important lecture on church growth while Roennfeldt lectured on discipleship and evangelism in the early church, focusing on the contents of his book, "Following the Apostles' Vision," which was recently translated into Japanese and published in Japan.

The Japan Union Conference has set the following themes as its basic evangelism policy for 2021-2025: 1) Pastors are to be apostles. 2) Lay members are to be disciples. 3) Churches are to be light and salt. During this pastors' training seminar, we learned what is needed to promote this basic policy. In the discussions, sorted by generation and church size, there were lively debates, which provided great hope for the future of evangelism in Japan.

Japan is an island nation, which sometimes fosters a limited perspective. However, we are grateful for the new stimulation provided by these lecturers. I hope this pastors' training seminar will revitalize evangelism throughout Japan.

Response to the Noto Peninsula Earthquake

January 1 begins the New Year in Japan, a time when families gather together to relax and spend time together. However, on this January 1, 2024, a major earthquake struck the Hokuriku region.

The earthquake, measuring a 7.6 magnitude, claimed more than 230 lives leaving a trail of destruction, impacting hundreds of communities, and affecting more than 44,000 homes.

There are three Seventh-day Adventist church companies in Hokuriku, but there was no significant damage to the structures or the church members.

Japan is a country prone to earthquakes, and ADRA Japan has been involved in disaster relief efforts since

the 1995 Great Hanshin-Awaji Earthquake, the 2011 Great East Japan Earthquake, and the 2016 Kumamoto Earthquake. ADRA responded quickly to the recent Hokuriku earthquake as well.

On January 3, ADRA had already launched a fundraising campaign. Many donations were received from outside Japan, especially from Taiwan. By January 8, there had been 2,200 bottles of beverages and 4,000 servings of soybean meat food donated by the Adventist SAN-IKU



FOOD COMPANY. The soybean meat pouches can be eaten without heating, making them very useful in the affected areas. In places where the water supply had been cut off, ADRA provided support such as hot showers, footbaths, and mobile cafes with the disaster response bus.

The situation in Hokuriku will improve, but ADRA Japan will continue to provide necessary support from time to time.

As of Feb. 7, 2024, 160 donations had been received with many warm encouraging messages. We sincerely thank those who have supported us through their donations and prayers. Please continue to pray for the work still going on in response to this earthquake.

President Kim Ilmok, in his address, commended the commitment of the students, expressing hope that their endeavors would lead to a global acceptance of the gospel and salvation.

Geumcheon Haneulsaem Church Members Complete Bible Reading Challenge

On Dec. 23, 2023, the Geumcheon Haneulsaem Church held a 'Bible Reading Completion Ceremony,' to celebrate their successful drive for its members to read the entire Bible in 2023. Out of approximately 80 members, 58 successfully completed the challenge, instilling a sense of pride and gratitude, while emphasizing the importance of leading a gospelcentered life.

Three years ago, the church's new pastor, Park WooByoung, identified the need to strengthen the internal foundation of the church members. Hence, he adopted the slogan "By the Power of the Word! Through the Grace of Prayer," and strongly emphasized Bible reading. As a result, over 70% of the congregation completed the Bible reading.

Elder Hwang JooYeon, the church's mission committee director for four years, said, "Everyone takes on

challenges, but back then, I honestly doubted how many would succeed when the pastor first suggested the Bible reading. I thought, 'Well, a few more people might succeed besides those who do it yearly.' However, almost every member succeeded in the end, except for newcomers and young children." He credited Pastor Park's constant encouragement and support as the key to their success.

In practice, Pastor Park set a daily reading goal of about 30 minutes, posting the progress chart on the church bulletin board. During the worship, he acknowledged and encouraged individuals who read the Bible. For those who hadn't started, he urged them to take on the 'Bible Reading Challenge,' which naturally led to an atmosphere of checking progress together, fostering communal engagement with the Word. Even those who initially hesitated found encouragement and successfully completed the challenge.



Elder Bae DeokHwan expressed his joy and shared his intention to cherish the 'Bible Reading Completion Certificate' as a family treasure, stating, "This brings me even greater happiness because I did it with my wife. We woke up every morning at 4:30 a.m., and read the Bible for 30 minutes. Experiencing the Word afresh each time made me realize I missed out on this wonderful thing in the past." He pledged to diligently read the prophetic books this year.

The oldest among the completers was Deaconess Yoo HaeYeon, who was born in 1932. She had already completed reading the Bible two or three times a year before. Deaconess Yoo, who prepared a large-printed Bible before her eyesight worsened, brightened as she said, "Reading the Bible allows us to discern right from wrong. I particularly love Proverbs. By regularly consuming the Word, like meals at breakfast, lunch, and dinner, I can stay

healthy and attend church."

Elder Lee ByungGuk, the mission committee chairman, said, "Honestly, in the beginning, the Bible was my 'sleeping pill." However, he laughed and said that he felt the blessing of understanding difficult parts by reading commentaries and experiencing the joy of discovering the truth.

He highlighted his favorite verse, John 3:16, and said, "When I read the Bible, I feel like I am walking with God. So, even in the rough journey of life, I have no worries. Thinking about God's love brings tears to my eyes, and I constantly ponder how I should respond and live in this love. Every time, the determination I wrote in the corner of the Bible comes to mind, providing significant help."

Deaconess Kim KyungSook is busier than most, but her passion surpassed that of others. Despite starting her day at 3:30 a.m., and finishing work at 10 p.m., she said, "I always carry the Bible. I read it on the subway, during meals, and breaks. I heard from a deacon at a Protestant church that he reads the Bible seven times a year. Then I thought, 'What am I doing who attends the True church?' So, I am reading the Bible whenever I have time."

Deaconess Kim MiHwa, who had been away from God's embrace for 32 years, confessed, "At first, I didn't have the courage, but after a severe injury, I thought, 'If I die like this, Jesus won't forgive for my sins, so I should repent.' I found a church and got closer to the Word due to the Bible reading trend." She unfolded her notebook, filled to the brim with notes from studying the New Testament, and said, "I deeply realized that the Jesus found in the four Gospels is patient and the embodiment of true love."

As we enter a new year, many Christians traditionally set a goal to complete reading the Bible as an accomplishment for the year. Often these goals fade after a few days or are abandoned midway. This year, let us hope that, when faced with busyness, tiredness, illness, or distractions, we can draw inspiration from the testimonies of the Geumcheon Haneulsaem Church members and renew our commitment to the Word.



KUC Women's Ministries holds Evangelistic Meetings in Bangladesh

The trip to Bangladesh by the KUC Women's Ministries teams marked the first simultaneous evangelistic meeting since Bangladesh became a part of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division.

Pastor Kim W.S., Bangladesh Union Mission president, and Kim S.K., Children's Ministry director in Bangladesh, requested that KUC Women's Ministry visit Bangladesh and hold evangelistic meetings outside of Dhaka; along with the Korean Adventist Women's Association, KUC's Women's Ministries prepared for this endeavor by gathering information about Bangladesh and raising funds through bazaars.

They made extensive preparations for more than a year in Korea and Bangladesh, with the support of the BAUM President, staff members, and pastors from the Northern Mission. In Bangladesh, they prepared beds and supplies for the evangelistic teams, including gifts and snacks for attendees, with the funds the team sent in advance.

Even though Bangladesh is a distant mission field requiring two flight transfers, 35 women volunteered. Therefore, they were able to form five evangelistic teams. The journey to the mission field was arduous. It took about 38 hours due to weather disruptions, including an emergency landing in Kolkata, India, and a detour to Bangkok before finally reaching Bangladesh. Some teams opted to save on airfare to sponsor water projects in Bangladesh. So, they endured overnight stays at airports while transiting through China. However, upon arrival at the mission field, they saw the church members waiting for them even late at night, welcoming them with flowers, traditional dances, and

music, washing away the fatigue of their long journey.

Five teams served Gobindopur Church, Deborah Church, Aconpara Church, Kuzura Church, and Baribide Church in the Northern Mission of BAUM. In the morning, they conducted Bible schools, followed by home visits and medical checkups in the afternoon, and in the evening, they delivered sermons. In addition, they provided opportunities for attendees to experience various aspects of Korean culture alongside handicraft activities. In these evangelistic meetings, 40 souls from five churches were baptized and born again as children of God. In some areas, baptism took place in rivers. Baptism brought great joy not only to God but also to all who were watching. To the newly baptized, they gave a Bible as a gift.

To conduct missionary work, a considerable budget is required. However, God provided for all their needs. The WM department of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division and many other sponsors provided funds for expenses during the mission journey, including gifts and supporting projects such as water facilities, bathrooms, kitchen construction, church remodeling, and more. Five teams provided eight wells (water facilities), two bathrooms, and two kitchens, prioritizing support for classroom expansion, church roof improvement, and carpet replacement.

The Women's Ministries team stated, "We earnestly hope that the churches can proclaim the living water of Jesus to the souls in their community. We thank God for mobilizing the women in KUC to 'GO' and share the love of Jesus in Bangladesh."

Bangladesh Adventist Union Mission: Understanding the Region and its Potential

Officially known as the People's Republic of Bangladesh, the South Asian country is large and densely populated with 170 million people in an area of 148,460 square kilometers. In 1947 the partition of India created East and West Pakistan based on religious makeup. East Pakistan emerged as the independent nation of Bangladesh in 1971 after nine months of war for liberation from the governing West Pakistan. Bangladesh is 89% Muslim and 10% Hindu. Christians are a microscopic minority at 0.3% of the total population, their numbers close to 500,000. There are 60 church denominations, cohabiting together in harmony and love, but also competing in terms of evangelism.

The Bangladesh Adventist Union Mission celebrated its 110th anniversary in November of 2016, and is now at 118 years of its glorious journey of evangelism in Bangladesh. The Seventh-day Adventist work was first pioneered in what was then called Bengal by colporteurs in the last decade of the nineteenth century. When Elder J. L. Shaw, the regional director of India Mission, visited Gopalgonj, he met K. D. Poddar and other believers. These people were already keeping the Sabbath after Poddar learned the Imran Mrong BAUM Communication Secretary

truth from a tract received at Sealdah Station in Kolkata. In 1906 Lal Gopal Mookerjee, one of the earliest converts, went to East Bengal and opened a mission station at Gopalgonj at his own expense. In 1907 Purna Chandra Dey, Manob Sircar, Krishnadhan Poddar, Ananda Chandra Halder, Sadhan Chandra Sircar, and Purna Chanda Gayen were the first men to be baptized in East Bengal.

The territories of BAUM comprise East Bangladesh Mission, North Bangladesh Mission, South Bangladesh Mission, and West Bangladesh Mission. There are 33,603 church members attending 127 organized churches and 288 company churches in the country. These congregations are nurtured by 37 ordained pastors, 167 gospel workers, 415 church elders, 377 deacons and 416 deaconesses. The Union has numerous departments and other supporting ministries such as: Public Affairs and Religious Liberty; Bangladesh Financial Association; Education and Communication department; Ministerial Association and Chaplaincy Ministries; Family and Women's Ministries; Children and Ministerial Spouses Ministries; Stewardship and Planed Giving and Trust Services; Sabbath School and Publishing Ministries; Health and AWR ministries; and Bangladesh Children Sponsorship Service and Youth Ministries.

Each department has its own mission and objective to proclaim the Three Angels' Messages to the world as well as looking after the well-being of its church members. BAUM is blessed with seven boarding schools and 15 Adventist International Mission Schools (AIMS), 123 village schools and two colleges: Bangladesh Adventist Seminary and College, and the Bangladesh Adventist Nursing College. BAUM serves more than 13,139 students who are receiving a holistic education, preparing them for a useful and joy-filled life. There are 622, caring, kind, and courageous teachers who reflect the character of Christ. ADRA Bangladesh is a humanitarian arm of Bangladesh Adventist Union Mission, providing emergency relief in communities across Bangladesh. BAUM also gives dental service through its dental healthcare.

Ministerial Advisory and Leadership Certification Training Program



The Ministerial Association of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division conducted a three-day leadership certification training program for local church elders, deacons and deaconesses, Jan. 20-22, 2024, in Bangladesh at the Seventh-day Adventist Maranatha Seminary and School, located about 300 kilometers northwest of the capital city of Dhaka. The purpose of this training was to help the local church leaders understand the biblical functions of their roles in their congregations as well as training for future leadership roles.

Pastor Jonas Arrais, ministerial secretary of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division shared biblically-sound topics with the 70 participants, who were moved by the Holy Spirit, and inspired to strengthen their skills and abilities as leaders to carry out their entrusted responsibilities in the church.

On Jan. 22, 2024, a Ministerial Advisory was held.



Those present were: Bangladesh Union Mission (BAUM) Executive Secretary Timothy Roy; North Bangladesh Mission Ministerial Secretary Benjamin Mrong; South Bangladesh Mission Ministerial Secretary Daniel Falia; East Bangladesh Mission Ministerial Secretary Milton Das; West Bangladesh Mission Ministerial Secretary Mathew Adhikary; and BAUM Ministerial Association Administrative Assistant Imran Mrong.

The Advisory was facilitated by Pastor Arrais who urged them "to be professional in their service and build reciprocal relationships with local church elders, deacons, deaconesses and church members to be successful in their pastoral ministry." He challenged them "to study thoroughly the SDA Church Manuel and Working Policy, while doing extraordinary and historic tasks beyond their job descriptions that would be useful resources to the coming generation and church members."

Pakistan Adventist nursing college fulfilled a longawaited project, finalizing lecture halls and skills labs for the formal launch.

On a beautiful Sabbath afternoon on Dec. 2, 2023, during the centennial celebration week, a ceremony marked the completion of the nursing college construction. The college is expected to serve as a cornerstone for healthcare professionals dedicated to serving the community in Pakistan. This project was possible thanks to funds from the "10/40 Window Mission Project" of the Korean Union Conference. The nursing college consists of two buildings, both two stories high. The lecture halls, constructed with a courtyard, house facilities such as professor rooms, offices, and lecture halls. The skills lab features physiology labs, clinical skills and simulation labs, a library, and other auxiliary facilities. Thanks to the cooperation of Sahmyook Health University's nursing department, various lab equipment necessary for a quality learning environment has been provided.

Apart from the four-year academic course, the college also offers two-year certification courses for Certified



Nursing Assistants (CNA), Lady Health Visitors (LHV), and Community Midwifery Worker Programs (CMW).

The school has a vision to be a hub for training top nursing experts, fostering integrity, and delivering exceptional medical care. Their plan involves nurturing leaders dedicated to delivering compassionate care and fully committed to the field of nursing.

For this purpose, they have set core values called "I CARE," which stands for Integrity, Caring, Accountability, Respect for others, and Excellence.

"Our mission is to educate every student to become holistic health caregivers. We will strive to go beyond the individual and family to meet the needs of the local community and the nation. Our aim is to develop nursing professionals with integrity, innovation, empathy towards patients, and neighbors," said College Dean Ji S.B. President of the Pakistan Union Conference, Lee M.J. said, "Although we have not yet received government approval, we expect to obtain it soon. The path ahead seems long and there are many shortcomings. However, I believe that God's grace and blessings will guide us. I ask for continuous prayers and support to ensure the successful opening and operation of the nursing college."

Pastor Kang SoonGi, president of the Korean Union Conference, expressed his congratulations on the completion of the lecture halls and skills lab, stating, "I am eager to witness the growth of this institution. The Korean Church is committed to keeping up its ongoing interest in fostering a deeper partnership with Pakistan Adventist Seminary and College."

In Pakistan, many individuals grapple with lifestyle diseases, often stemming from their penchant for high-calorie and salty foods. The institution holds optimism that well-educated Adventist nurses can break down barriers, embracing a mission-driven approach toward patients and advocating the health gospel of the Adventist Church. The Pakistan Adventist Seminary and College sought prayers from the Korean Church to secure the initial contract, a pivotal step for the Nursing College's approval and collaboration with a training hospital.

"Medical missionary work is the pioneer work of the gospel. In the ministry of the Word and in the medical missionary work the gospel is to be preached and practiced." (MH.144.3)

Sri Lanka Mission and Himalayan Section —New Challenges, New Hope

On Feb. 19, 2024, the Northern Asia-Pacific Division approved the elections of Pastor Jung HyoSoo(photo above) as president of the Sri Lanka Mission and Pastor Kim HaeSung as secretary of the Himalayan Section.

Pastor Jung HyoSoo, had previously served as the president of the West Asia Field (Iran, Turkey, and the northern portion of Cyprus). Pastor Kim HaeSung had previously been the director of Adventist Mission in the Himalayan Section. Both are Pioneer Mission Movement (PMM) missionaries.

Sri Lanka is a small island nation off

the southern tip of India, with a population of 22 million people. The religious makeup of the country is: Buddhism (70%), Hinduism (12%), and Islam (9.7%). The Christian population is 7.4%. The Sri Lanka Mission operates 35 churches and 21 meeting places, with an average attendance of 625 out of a membership of 3,312.

The Himalayan Section covers the country of Nepal, known as "the roof of the world." It is a mountainous country with a population of 31 million. The religious distribution includes: Hinduism (81.2%), Buddhism (9%), Islam (4%), and Kirat (3%), with Christianity accounting for one percent of the population. The Himalayan Section oversees 26 churches and 82 worship places, with an average attendance of 4,312 out of 9,400 members.

Recently, activities of various organizations and evangelistic groups have led to increased exchanges with Korean churches. In particular, Nepal was selected as one of the countries supported by the Korean Union Conference Adventist Mission Trust Project, leading to the establishment of a "Vocational Training School and Urban Center of Influence" in Kathmandu. Although there is a degree of religious freedom in Nepal, proselytization is not allowed under the "anti-conversion law." However, voluntary conversion by locals does happen.

The Northern Asia-Pacific Division is expecting the missionary work in these countries to be further activated through the new allocation. The Division stated, "We will further expand exchanges and support for Sri Lanka and Nepal, enhance relations, and strive to more powerfully spread the Three Angels' Messages locally. We hope that the overseas expansion of Korean missionaries will continue to increase, thereby growing their influence in the world church and expanding missionary touchpoints."

The spiritual landscape of Nepal experienced a profound transformation as various churches came together for the 10 Days of Prayer on Jan. 11-20, 2024. 
