Adventist student groups are now active on many public university campuses throughout NSD. These students are not waiting for the future—they are serving God boldly right now.

NSD is also deeply committed to the North Korea Mission. Although people cannot freely go into North Korea, God is still working. Through prayer, humanitarian projects, and careful planning, we are preparing for the day when the gospel can freely enter the country.

We thank God for the growing work in South Asia—in Bangladesh, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, and Nepal. These places are not just receiving mission—they are now becoming strong mission centers themselves. Local leaders, church members, and youth are courageously sharing the message, often in difficult situations.

This General Conference Session reminds us that we are not alone. As we see flags from around the world, hear stories of faith, and sing songs of hope, we remember what Jesus said:

“And this gospel of the kingdom will be preached in the whole world as a testimony to all nations, and then the end will come” (Matthew 24:14).

We invite you, our global church family, to pray for NSD. Pray for our pastors, missionaries, and members as they serve in both familiar and difficult places. May this issue of News & Views remind you that the mission is alive, and the message is still moving—through every hand, every voice, and every heart dedicated to God’s call.

I WILL GO IN THE MOST CHALLENGING FIELD

The Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD) is a territory of diverse ethnicities and religions with a long history of rich cultural heritage. Throughout its vast landscapes, 680 million people live in the countries of Japan, Korea, Bangladesh, Pakistan, Taiwan, Mongolia, Sri Lanka, Nepal, and North Korea.

New Territories of NSD

In 2019, the Chinese Union Mission, part of NSD up to that time, became directly attached to the General Conference, wherein NSD requested new territories to add to its division. On Oct. 23, 2023, at the eighth business session of the Northern Asia-Pacific

Division, the territories of Bangladesh, Pakistan, Sri Lanka (previously of the Southern Asia-Pacific Division), and Nepal (previously of the Southern Asia Division) joined NSD.

Since then, the division's Muslim population grew to nearly 400 million, presenting challenges and opportunities. Added to the deeply rooted religions of Buddhism, Taoism, Shintoism, and Hinduism, these diverse but entrenched beliefs both humble and implore the Northern Asia-Pacific Division to get on its knees in prayer for the millions within its lands who need a Savior.

Challenges in New Territories

Through diverse efforts and initiatives, NSD officers and directors immediately began visiting these newly added countries. They held mission strategy meetings with each country's union and mission officers, visited educational, medical, and mission institutions to assess the situation. And they encouraged local leaders, listened to their challenges, and discussed potential improvements.

As a result, they were able to lay the foundation for further development in mission work in these new territories.

General Conference Leaders Visit NSD

With unified awareness of the great challenges of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division, the leaders of the General Conference joined NSD last November to encourage and strengthen those who have been called to carry out this weighty mission.

President Ted N.C. Wilson, Executive Secretary Erton C. Köhler, Treasurer Paul H. Douglas, and Assistant to the President, Magdiel Pérez Schulz visited Korea and attended NSD's yearend meeting and the 120th anniversary of the Korean Union Conference.

During this time Elder Wilson delivered encouraging messages to the division's executive committee. He led a revival meeting at Sahmyook Central Church in Seoul, and preached God's message for the Korean Adventist members during the 120th Anniversary, strengthening Korean believers to continue in their pursuit of mission.

With a dedicated commitment to achieving a balance between mission and spirituality during the last quinquennium, NSD actively promoted the General Conference initiatives, through programs like Global Total Member Involvement, Comprehensive Health Ministry, Biblical Creationism, Back to the Altar, and Human Sexuality.

Global Total Member Involvement

As a part of the General Conference's emphasis on "Global TMI—Disciple Making Evangelism and Harvest 25," the Northern Asia-Pacific Division launched the "Loud Voice 2025" project. This project has been holding simultaneous evangelistic meetings in 2,025 locations around the division with the goal of baptizing 20,250 people throughout the year 2025.

Church workers and members across NSD have been actively participating in these evangelistic efforts in the spirit of "Mission First," dedicating their lives to God and to fulfilling Jesus' gospel commission.

To accomplish this, NSD has established strategic and systematic mission projects designed to reach people in this constantly changing world.

Mission Refocus

Through the General Conference "Mission Refocus" strategy, NSD has chosen to concentrate evangelistic efforts on the frontlines, where the gospel is most urgently needed, developing plans to successfully share the gospel.

Pioneer Mission Movement

In 2002, NSD created the Pioneer Mission Movement to reach the frontlines of the mission field. Since then, 149

PMM missionaries have been dispatched to 26 countries. This project sends pastoral families to overseas mission fields for six years, to plant churches and share the gospel with local communities.

A PMM Pastor's Mission Story

Pastor Kwon Soon-Bum is one of the PMM missionaries sent by NSD to Taiwan. Initially he faced many challenges because of the secular environment and indigenous religions in Taiwan. Yet, God has worked amazing miracles through his ministry. The church gradually grew from 15 members, with 30 young people receiving baptism, and 70 more people finding new life in Jesus through his efforts.

Pastor Kwon is also dedicated to the Public Campus Ministry, sharing the gospel with young people. He aims to establish a university mission center and to develop mission-study materials to train student missionaries.

Hwang Lu-Xian was among those students Pastor Kwon met through his ministry. Hwang first visited Beitun Church through the campus ministry and was baptized in July 2020, but he faced strong opposition from his family. Most Taiwanese families follow Buddhism, which is deeply rooted in their daily lives and forms an essential part of their existence. Facing rejection, he eventually left his home and lived in the Beitun Church for about two years,

holding on to his faith while serving the church.

Despite these hardships, he experienced God's guidance and embraced a new dream. Following that dream, he moved to Korea at the end of 2023 to begin his studies at Sahmyook University. He is now studying for a master's degree in theology at the seminary, responding to God's calling.

Across Taiwan, Pioneer Mission Movement pastors and young Public Campus Ministry missionaries are spreading the gospel. They continue to build the kingdom of God on campuses, in churches, and in daily lives.

So far, PMM missionaries have been sent to Japan, Taiwan, Mongolia, China, the Philippines, Hong Kong, Macao, Korea, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Congo, Uganda, Russia, Tanzania, Indonesia, India, Kosovo, Türkiye, Northern Cyprus, Peru, Armenia, Vietnam, Pakistan, Myanmar, Nepal, Sri Lanka, and Cambodia. As a result, 369 churches and companies have been established, and 34,719 people have been baptized.

1000 Missionary Movement

Since 1993 the 1000 Missionary Movement has played a crucial role in frontline missions sending young people into mission fields empowering them through dedicated service. After intensive training on the 1000 MM campus

in the Philippines, operated jointly by the Southern Asia-Pacific and Northern Asia-Pacific Divisions, these young people are sent two-by-two to mission fields where they devote one year for mission.

For the past 32 years, nearly 12,000 young people from 64 countries have served as missionaries. The fruits of their labor include 80,585 baptisms, 809 church buildings constructed, and 1,530 churches and companies established in 47 countries.

North Korea Mission

Among all the challenges NSD encounters in its mission work, the most difficult is reaching North Korea. Even today, 25 million North Koreans suffer from hunger, lack of freedom, and have never had the opportunity to hear about God. Under the guidance of the General Conference, NSD established the North Korea Mission department in 2021 and is actively involved in mission activities for North Korea.

To prepare for the opportunity of entering North Korea,

NSD has coordinated a Prayer Campaign, engaging many dedicated people in intercessory prayer. Missionaries are now being trained through various educational programs to be ready to share the gospel when the time comes to enter this closed country. Recently, because of these efforts, North Korean defectors have accepted the Adventist faith and have been baptized.

Departmental Ministries

Each department of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division has carried out various initiatives over the past year.

The Stewardship Department continues to hold seminars for pastors and church members across NSD to educate and encourage workers and members to be faithful in their tithes and offerings, explaining the importance of putting God first and demonstrating His goodness through faithful giving.

The Youth Department successfully organized the Third International Pathfinder Camporee with 4,000 participants, fostering the faith of young people. Changed

lives through the activities and spiritual gatherings stand as a testament to the hard work of planning and overseeing such an event.

Sabbath School and Personal Ministries as well as the Ministerial and Children's, Women's and Family Ministries, faithfully visit the various NSD countries to instruct in how to raise up children, form happy marriages, and grow stronger spiritually as pastors and spouses. Their work addresses the realities that pastors and churches face.

The Education Department spreads its umbrella over each school institution to ensure schools and colleges remain true to academic standards while imparting the love and saving grace of Jesus, knowing that one of the greatest tools of evangelism of the Seventh-day Adventist Church is through education.

The Health Ministries Department continues to oversee numerous evangelistic seminars aimed at training local churches in healthier habits, providing foot massage therapy, healthy meal preparation, and informing members and non-members of the health hazards related to a poor diet and lack of exercise.

The Communication Department uses the power of the written word, film and video, and the fast-paced, ever-changing Internet possibilities to inform and reach millions of people within seconds. Its work in technology constantly finds new avenues for the ageless story of Jesus and His love.

Adventist Mission oversees the multiple mission groups within NSD, encouraging and instructing missionaries, finding the best candidates for the mission field, visiting mission sites to see and feel what missionaries are experiencing, and sending forth with God's blessing courageous and fearless men and women ready to reveal the love of God to those around them.

Institutional Growth

Currently there are 233 institutions including universities and colleges, secondary and primary schools, hospitals and clinics, publishing houses and food industries serving the people of the NSD territory. Every year thousands of students accept Jesus Christ as their personal Savior in these centers of academia. Each institution is an important soul-winning ministry where God's love is practiced, and many people are meeting Jesus and being transformed.

Our gracious God has richly blessed the humble efforts of His people in the Japan Union Conference, the Korean Union Conference, the Pakistan Union Section, the Bangladesh Union Mission, the Taiwan Conference, the Mongolia Mission, the Sri Lanka Mission, and the Nepal Section as they have worked to spread in a mighty way the Three Angels' Messages to the hundreds of millions who call our territory "home." We praise God for the wonderful way in which he has guided our footsteps to accomplish His mission.

I Will Go in the Most Challenging Field

The Northern Asia-Pacific Division exists for the sole purpose of placing "Mission First," to carry out the gospel commission of reaching 680 million people within the NSD territory. Following the mission given by God, we will continue to proclaim the gospel to the ends of the earth, shouting the slogan "I Will Go!" Mission is not our choice; it is our identity and our life. As Jesus' Second Coming draws near, let us continue to move forward! Maranatha!

1000 Missionary Movement

The 1000 Missionary Movement (1000 MM) is a powerful initiative of the of the Seventh-Day Adventist Church, with the mission of training, sending, and supporting 1,000 young missionaries every year to various mission fields worldwide. Established by the Northern and Southern Asia-Pacific Divisions, 1000 MM is committed to developing young people who are passionate about sharing the message of Christ through selfless service and evangelism.

A Visionary Beginning

The story of 1000 MM began in 1991, when Dr. Lee Jairyong was deeply moved by the missionary work of a woman pastor in Indonesia. Inspired by her efforts, he envisioned a training center that would prepare young people to serve as missionaries across the globe. With this vision in mind, Dr. Lee proposed the establishment of the 1000 Missionary Movement. His proposal was approved by the Adventist International Institute of Advanced Studies (AIAS) board on Nov. 7, 1991, and later endorsed by 100 delegates from 13 unions during the annual council in Singapore.

By 1992, the 1000 MM officially began as a global mission project, and in 1995, the Asia-Pacific Division

took it under its direct supervision. For over 30 years, the movement has remained one of the largest and most successful missionary training centers in the world, continuing to send young men and women to various mission fields globally.

Training for Service

Missionaries who join 1000 MM undergo an extensive, holistic three-month training program. The first month focuses on language skills, specifically English, to ensure that they can effectively communicate with those they serve. Filipino missionaries serve as language teachers, ensuring that all participants can speak the common language of their mission fields.

For the next two months, training intensifies. The program includes spiritual growth, Bible study, physical endurance exercises, cultural sensitivity training, and practical survival skills. The missionaries participate in daily morning exercises, maintain a vegetarian diet, and engage in spiritual activities like prayer, Bible meditation, and group worship. This rigorous schedule is aimed at cultivating unity, self-sacrificial love, and a deep commitment to Christ.

A significant part of the training is the Cottage Meeting

Practicum, where missionaries learn to conduct personal Bible studies, provide pastoral care, and implement evangelistic outreach programs. By the end of the three-month program, these missionaries are well-equipped to serve in various mission fields, each uniquely prepared to spread the Gospel with a compassionate heart.

The program culminates in a dispatching ceremony, where the newly trained missionaries are sent out into the world to begin their mission work. The journey is not only about preaching the Word but about living it out through actions, whether it be house visitations, Bible studies, providing health assessments, or even offering free massages and prayers.

Mission Field Activities and Impact

In the field, missionaries engage in a wide range of activities aimed at uplifting the lives of the people they serve. The 62nd Missionary Batch (April 2024 – January 2025) achieved remarkable milestones, including leading 1,153 souls to baptism and helping establish 32 new congregations. Their tireless efforts led to the creation of 901 small groups and the organization of 199 evangelistic programs, impacting thousands of lives in the communities they served.

Similarly, the 63rd Missionary Batch (October 2024 – July 2025) continued this legacy of service by leading 234 people to baptism, initiating 570 small groups, and participating in church building projects across nine countries. These accomplishments highlight not only the effectiveness of the missionaries' efforts in reaching the lost but also the deep, long-lasting spiritual impact they have on those they encounter.

Additionally, Extender Missionaries, seasoned members

who continue their mission work even after their initial deployment, have also made significant contributions. From 2019 to present, these missionaries have led over 2,300 individuals to baptism, established more than 1,200 small groups, and built or renovated churches. Their commitment to the mission work exemplifies the motto, "Once a missionary, always a missionary."

Impressive Statistics and Global Reach

As of March 31, 2025, the 1000 Missionary Movement has reached significant milestones. The movement has led 81,486 individuals to baptism and contributed to the establishment of 1,533 congregations. Over the years, it has dispatched 11,937 missionaries to 47 countries, making an indelible mark on the mission field. Of this number,

7,690 missionaries have been sent from the headquarters in the Philippines, and 4,247 from seven other branches of Bangladesh, India, East Indonesia Manado, West Indonesia Medan, Mongolia, Pakistan, and Peru.

Pioneer Mission Movement(PMM)

The Pioneer Mission Movement (PMM) is a global mission project of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD) for the church planting in its territory. For this mission movement, the pastors who are equipped with the mission spirit will be sent to foreign countries for five to six years. Most of NSD's countries are in the 10/40 window where Christian ratios are very low compared to other parts of the world. Only 3.2 percent out of about seven-hundred million people are Christians, and the other 97 percent of people are Muslims, Buddhists, Taoists, Shintoists, and atheists. Therefore, NSD has a big challenge in mission. Facing this missional challenge, however, PMM missionaries will go to "every nation, tribe, language, and people" with the everlasting gospel in their hands.

Brief PMM History

It has been 22 years since the initial five PMM missionaries and their families were dispatched to Japan as the first batch of this movement. Since then, PMM has experienced

remarkable growth, with 151 missionaries dispatched to 27 countries, establishing over 350 churches, and baptizing more than 34,000 souls. In particular, PMM, which started as a mission initiative within the division, expanded beyond the boundaries of NSD in 2009 when it began sending missionaries to Kazakhstan and Congo. Over the past 15 years, it has dispatched 33 missionaries to 19 countries outside NSD, growing into a global mission movement.

23rd PMM Dispatch Dedication

On Nov. 9, 2024, there was the 23rd PMM Dispatching Dedication Ceremony at Sahmyook University. What made this dedication special was the presence of three General Conference officers: GC President Elder Ted Wilson, who rendered a message of high calling from Isaiah chapter six; GC Executive Secretary Erton Kohler, who gave an encouraging message; and GC Treasurer Paul Douglas, who offered a dedicatory prayer for the new PMM families.

PMM Family Care Programs

Taiwan PMM Family Retreat: On Aug. 5-8, 2024, a special Family Care Retreat for Taiwan PMM families was held at Sanyu Health Education Center at Taiwan Adventist College. From the General Conference, Amy Whitsett, GC ISE Care and Support manager, lead various programs, such as the Parent Education seminar and the Third Culture Kids activities. Ms. Jeon YoungSook, West Central Korean Conference Family Ministries director, lead meaningful family-interactive programs. There was teen and children's programs, as well. All participating PMM families experienced comforting and healing throughout the whole program.

1st PMM Family Re-entry Retreat: There was a special retreat on Jeju Island Feb. 16-19, 2025, for all PMM families who have returned from their mission fields for the last five years. From the General Conference World Mission Institute, three speakers, Ronald Kuhn, Mildred Castillo, and Enid Harris, joined to help this program. Another team of psychological specialists from Sahmyook University, Dr. Jeong Seongjin and Ms Kim SunKyoung, helped with this program. The program was designed to give PMM participants time to speak. While sharing their experiences and emotions, they also experienced healing and recovery. Missionary children were also able to create positive connections with other missionary children.



North Korea Mission

North Korea remains one of the most closed and persecuted nations for the gospel. To advance mission efforts and hasten Christ's return, the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD), under the guidance of the General Conference, established the North Korea Mission Department in 2021 and continues active outreach.

1. Prayer Movement

Recognizing that only God can open the door to North Korea, prayer is central to the mission. NSD members pray daily at 11:45 a.m., BukBukBuk youth missionaries pray every Wednesday night, and Priscilla & Aquila Lay Missionaries hold special prayer meetings across Conferences. The second Sabbath of November is dedicated as the World Prayer Sabbath for North Korea.

2. Missionary Training

NSD is training missionaries who will immediately go to North Korea to share the gospel when God opens the door to North Korea. Missionaries are trained twice a year for three years in four groups: pastor missionaries (NKPM), lay missionaries (Priscilla & Aquila), youth missionaries (BukBukBuk), and North Korean defector missionaries (Uimyeong).




Pakistan Union Section



Pakistan Adventist Seminary and College (PASC) is actively conducting discipleship training for both students and staff. Additionally, the institution is strengthening its annual evangelistic meetings held for college and local churches. In 2024 alone, two major evangelism sessions led to the baptism of 284 individuals.



PASC is faithfully carrying out its mission by training the next generation to serve with compassion, integrating faith with practical service. In 2024, PASC conducted and collaborated with international medical mission teams to provide free medical care for residents in surrounding communities. Through these joint efforts, the team offered general consultations, basic treatments, and health education to hundreds of individuals who have limited access to medical services.



The PASC campus hosts a 1000 Missionary Movement Training Center, dedicated to training young people for missionary service. Currently, the sixth cohort of missionaries has been commissioned and is actively engaged in mission work across various fields.

In addition, the training center is equipped with 36 private prayer rooms, providing a sacred space for spiritual formation programs designed for pastors and lay leaders. These facilities support deep personal devotion and leadership development, fostering a spirit of consecrated service within the broader mission of the Church.



PASC actively supports the mission of the Church by pioneering and rebuilding schools in newly reached regions. Schools established in Gojra, Khanewal, and Kotsondah operate as branch schools of PASC, receiving both educational guidance and financial support from the institution.



PASC operates the ABN Broadcasting Office as part of its online mission outreach. ABN is committed to sharing the Three Angels' Messages by providing a variety of sermons, Bible studies, and spiritual content to audiences through digital platforms.



A Community Learning Center is currently under construction to establish a kindergarten and an English-language school for the Muslim communities surrounding PASC. Through this initiative, the institution aims to make a positive impact on the local community and foster meaningful relationships through education.



Pakistan will conduct a 2025 Loud Voice event at more than 200 locations this year. UP to now, about 1000 souls have been baptized.



Pakistan Union has been constructing the Adventist Children Center at the Union headquarters since July 24, 2024, accommodating about 50 orphans. The Union hopes to inaugurate it on Dec. 12, 2025.


